HIS NAME FORGED.

Exciting Incident in the Dominion House of Commons.

A painful incident occurred in the House of Commons, Ottawa, Wednesday during the debate on partizanship in the railway service. Mr. Richard Blain read a letter which he said had been written by Hon. Wm. Ross (Victoria, N. S.,) when minister of militia in the twenties, to N. L. McKay of North Sydney, hat Government employee were expected to vote for the Government.

Hon. Mr. Ross, who is the oldest member of the House, being almost 80, rose and denied that he had ever written the letter. He had been asked to write the man mentioned, but had not done so. He had afterwards found that the letter had been written by W. S. Moore, who is now dead, and who signed his name to it. "I deny before this house and before my Father in Heaven that I wrote that letter. The matter had been up many times before," declared Mr. Ross, with evident agitation.

Mr. Ingram observed that it was a wonder Mr. Ross had not prosecuted the forger. This was met by cries of "shame," "Take it back," and "Cowardly."

Sir William Mulock declared that better treatment was due the oldest Parliamentarian in the house.

Mr. R. L. Borden intervened, and said that if the hon. gentlemen denied writing the letter they were bound to accept his statement, and the matter dropped.

FEW FOR THE MINISTRY.

Pan-Presbyterian Conference Discussing The Question.

London, July 7.—At the Pan Presbyterian conference Principal Caven opened the discussion on the deficiency of probationers for the ministry. If the present decline continues, he said, there will soon be too few pastors for the churches. In the United States the number of candidates was not within 203 of what it was a few years ago. In Canada the supply does not equal the demand. The same state of affairs exists in Scotland, England and Germany. The chief cause of the trouble is the tempting offers of commerce and the theological difficulties presented to young men. Dr. Moffatt said that one cause of the deficiency was that parents no longer kept prominently before the children the prospect of the ministry. The question was referred to the Business Committee.

THE CARLETON MURDERER.

Apparently Resigned to his Fate---Execution July 22nd.

Woodstock, N. B., July 9.—Notwithstanding a numerous signed petition, containing signatures from all parts of the county, among them that of the father of the murdered girl, Governor General Lord Minto has refused to grant a commutation of George Gee's sentence, and the prisoner will meet his death on the gallows on July 22, the date named by Chief Justice Tuck.

Nothing definite is known as to the hour of execution, whether Sheriff Hayward will or will not officiate, or where the last act in the tragedy will be. The supposition is that the execution will take place early in the morning; that the last scene will be witnessed by but few spectators; that the sheriff will personally perform his duty, and that the hanging will take place in the hall of the jail just inside the main door.

On Wednesday Gee in some way heard the news that the governor general had refused to change the sentence from death to life imprisonment. In conversation with the death watch, who intended to keep the news secret at present, Gee said the sentence was a just one and he would not find fault with the higher authorities for he did not expect to hear of anything else; but the news that came; he was willing and ready to die. He said those things with as little concern as he showed when he received the death sentence. To a visitor he remarked that in just fourteen days it would all be over.

While the prisoner can neither read or write, he is a most entertaining talker. He likes to have visitors call and talk with him, but dislikes those who call to gaze and point at him. He never or seldom talks of the murder of his cousin, Millie, but he has no objection to talk of his own life and his preparation for death.

He told Mrs. Bennie Gee recently that he would die without making any statement or confession of any kind.

The prisoner, who was twenty-three years of age recently, is gaining in flesh since his incarceration in the jail, and he looks well.

Gee has been out of his cell into the corridor, since his sentence, only on three occasions. The death watch, Constable Neill McKinnon, goes on duty at 9 o'clock p. m., when Gee retires for the night, and the constable remains on duty until 5.45 a. m.; the constable visits the jail at 7.45 and awakens the prisoner who has his breakfast at 8 o'clock; the constable gives him his dinner at 1 o'clock and his supper at 6 o'clock. This is the daily routine. Several lady visitors read books for Gee during the day.

The Salvation Army paid him a visit last Sunday and prayed with him. His Sunday visitors as a rule are members of the Advent church, who hold a service of prayers with him at 4 o'clock.

He has expressed a willingness to be baptized, and it is expected the ceremony will shortly be performed. His spiritual adviser is the primitive Baptist minister at Holmesville, who, with his wife, called on him last week. His parents were with him last week, returning home on Saturday last.

ST. JOHN PEOPLE DROWNED.

Capt. Peck, Wife and Daughter Met Death off Florida Coast.

Seldom has the north end section of St. John been so painfully shocked as it was Sunday morning, says the Sun, when news was received to the effect that Capt. George W. Peck, his wife and daughter, three former residents of that community, had been drowned on Saturday, off the coast of Florida. The news came in the form of a telegram to Mrs. Fred L. Hea, of 101 Adelaide street, from Dr. Herman Peck, of New York, stating that his father, Capt. George Peck, his mother, who is a sister of Mrs. Hea, and his sister, Miss Sarah J. Peck, had been drowned. The despatch said no more, leaving the grief stricken relatives with this meagre intelligence.

Capt. Peck, who formerly sailed out of St. John in the employ of Wm. Thomson & Co., and also with Judge Palmer and Troop & Son, and who left here about ten years ago, was captain of the steamer Mae, owned by A. H. Bull & Co., of New York, and running between that port and Florida. He had been in that employ for a number of years, and on the last trip south was accompanied by his wife and daughter. Capt. Peck was very well known in St. John, where he had many friends.

The bodies were recovered and the funeral will take place from the residence of his son, 560 Hancock street Brooklyn.

Captain Peck was about fifty years of age and born in Albert county. Miss Peck was fifteen years old.

Mrs. Peck's sisters, besides Mrs. F. L. Hea, are Miss Julia Cowan and Mrs. Fred W. Thomson, wife of the fishery inspector of this city, and Mrs. Sweet of Melrose, Mass. Her brothers are Moses Cowan, C. E. V. Cowan and Isaac Cowan, lumberman of the north end, Robert S. Cowan of the Savings Bank and Edward Cowan of the customs department.

Capt. Peck's other daughters are Mrs. Matilda Weed and Mrs. Susie Taylor of New York. The latter but a few days ago returned to the American metropolis after visiting relatives in St. John.

Fred Miles of the Glasier Steamboat Company, and son-in-law of Mrs. Thomson, wired back to New York for further particulars, but up to a late hour last night no details of the accident had been received. It was known that Capt. Peck intended to be away from New York for five weeks, and he sailed from that port two weeks ago. Miss Julia Cowan and Robert Sime of this city left today for Brooklyn to attend the funeral.

RUSSIAN GENERAL

Prepared Plans for the Invasion of India.

London, July 11.—The Daily Express today prints what it claims is General Kuropatkin's signed plan of invasion of British India which, it is stated, was filed in the Russian war office as the official method of proceeding in case of a war between Russia and Great Britain. The document goes into minute details and is three columns in length.

Briefly summed up Kuropatkin divides such a war into two campaigns, one ending with the capture of Herat and the other, after two or three years' administration of the country, with the capture of Cashmir, Kandahar and Kabul. After that says General Kuropatkin the British would find themselves without native support in India proper.

The plan deals minutely with the methods Russia sought to adopt to secure the co-operation of the Persians and Afghans by an elaborate system of agents and sheikhs. It estimates that one Turkestan army corps would be required in the initial stage of the campaign "which I should prefer to begin in November, as the weather is healthier for the men and all Russian ports are not frozen."

"A casus belli can at any time when required be found through a collision between Russians and Afghan outposts."

VISITING CARDS.
