St. John, Aug. 24.—One of the most fashionable weddings this year took place at 2.30 o'clock today in the little Anglican church of St. Paul at Lakeside, Kings county, near the summer residence of John A. MacAvity, when his eldest daughter, Miss Eleanor Louise, was united in marriage to William McLaren Angus, eldest son of William Angus, of Montreal, and manager of the St. John branch of the Amos Holden Co. The church was transformed into a bower of beauty, with arches of green and white spanning the aisles, etc. The gateways and entrances to the church were also decorated with golden rod, cedar and flags.

A special car took some two hundred guests from St. John to Lakeside station, where they were met by haycarts decorated with golden rod cedar and flags, and conveyed to the church.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. C. D. Schofield. The bride, who was given away by her father, was gown in cream crepe de chene, with Duchesse lace yoke and bertha. She also wore a Brussels lace veil and shamrock and heather in her hair, and carried in her hand a prayer book, the gift of Rev. John deSoyres. SAILOR DROWNED.

Newfoundland Man Met a Watery Grave in Cape Breton.

North Sydney, Aug. 24.—Word comes from Ingonish, of the drowning of Charles Pike, one of the crew of the Schooner Maggie A., which was bound from the channel to North Sydney, but was compelled to put in for shelter at Ingonish. Pike went out on the main boom to untie some reef point, and in some way fell into the harbor. George Dicks, captain of the schooner, leaped in to save the man, but could not swim himself. The other man seized the captain and both nearly drowned. Captain Dicks managed to release the drowning man's hold and was

himself rescued by Captain Walter Kerr and a young man named Walter. Pike's body was recovered an hour afterwards and has been sent to his home in Newfoundland for interment.

A ROYAL CHRISTENING

An Imposing Ceremony at St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 24.—The christening of the heir to the Russian throne occurred this morning at the church of Peterhof Palace, with imposing ceremony. A procession accompanied the infant prince from Alexandra Villa to the church. After administration of the sacrament to the heir by Metropolitia of St. Petersburg, the Emperor invested the young prince with Insignia of the Order of St. Andrew. Immediately thereafter the ringing of church bells and the firing of a salute of 101 guns announced the completion of the ceremony.

MILLS DESTROYED.

Montreal, Aug. 24.—The Seigneur's mills, owned by Delery MacDonald, including the flour mills, carding, woolen mill, tan house, and saw mill, were completely destroyed by fire early this morning. The loss including live stock and grain, is estimated at \$25,000. No insurance.

UNTRUTHFUL WAR NEWS.

Statistics of News Sent by Yellow Journals.

Berlin, Aug. 24.—Lloyds' Berlin issue for the current week publishes statistics of the news furnished by telegrams from the seat of war in the far east since the opening of hostilities, showing that if every telegram had told the truth Russia would have already lost 28 battle-ships like the Retvizan, 38 of the Petropavlovsk type, 145 cruisers, 411 torpedo boat destroyers, 1,487 torpedo boats, with 86,500 wounded soldiers, 186,000 prisoners of war, and 93,000 killed.

Japan, according to news received, would have lost 49 armored cruisers, 94 other cruisers, 98 destroyers and 594 torpedo boats, while her losses in soldiers would have been 98,000 killed, 119,000 prisoners of war and 131,000 wounded.

The same statistics give Port Arthur as assaulted twelve times, in one instance being taken after a hard fight, and six more times surrendering.

A FOUL DEED.

Sherman, Conn., Aug. 24.—A message was sent into town today from the Michael Briggs place, near the New York State line, to the effect that some time yesterday a man employed there killed another farm hand and, after blowing open a safe in which was kept about \$1,000 in cash and jewelry, stole a horse and escaped by the way of Pauling, N. Y. The family living on the place was absent. The body of the victim was found beside the well, to which place apparently it had been dragged from the house by the murderer. The family recently hired the two farm hands in New York State. They were foreigners, probably Poles, and their names were unknown.

FATAL FIREWORKS.

New York, Aug. 24.—Edward Whitman, aged 19 years, of Brooklyn, was instantly killed in an explosion of fireworks at the Manhattan Beach today. Whitman and Robert Armstrong were working in a small hut containing explosives for use at Pain's carnival on Thursday night. Armstrong escaped uninjured, but Whitman was killed, his body being charred beyond recognition. The only property loss was damage to the amount of \$100 to some carnival costumes stored in the hut.
