FROM ORIENT.

Toronto Artist Describes Visit to the Holy Land.

QUAINT PEOPLE, ENTRANCING LANDSCAPES, ARTISTIC TEMPERAMENTS.

Beauty Magnificence and Beggary.

"The Orient has an indefinable charm for the artist," said Mr. J. W. L. Foster, of 24 King street west, Toronto, lately returned from a trip to Jerusalem and the East, as one of a party of Canadians who attended the World's Sunday School convention, and of which Mr. F. W. Porter, of Fredericton was a member.

"Shepherds almost everywhere. Such quiet costumes and soft colors are totally unknown here. To see them best you must visit the hills. There are the flocks of sheep, goats and cattle—not much like our stock yards, by the way. Fashions among the shepherds are conservative. They still wear the long gowd-like saques of coarse linen and camel's hair, colored turbans and leggings wrapped with cords of skin—"

"Pardon!" interrupted the reporter, "but wouldn't a cattle buyer's coonskin coat and cane at the Junction be quite as picturesque?"

The artist smiled—and quietly went on to speak of the cities of the Orient.

"Everywhere the artistic temperament," he said. "On the adobe hut the most delicate tracing imaginable—done by the owners. Doorways carved like the facade of a cathedral."

People of the Orient.

"And the people?" queried the reporter. "Well, there are twenty-seven races, and you must excuse a detailed description. Paul could give you a better catalogue. Perhaps the Arabs are the most impressive. The north Arab is a magnificent type, tall, swarthy and semi-Hebrew in countenance. The south Arabs are squat and fair—really half-breeds."

"You saw caravans, of course?"

"Almost everywhere," he said. "We had one of our own."

"And Jerusalem—what of it?"

The Holy City.

"From Mount Scopus a most inexpressible idealistic picture," he replied. "Down into the city winds the Damascus road. With a brush the description would be easier. So far as words are concerned one can only quote the words, 'Beautiful for situation is Mount Zion.'"

"But at close quarters?"

"Disgusting. An Oriental city of the unimproved type, equalled in its walls, its streets defiled by sewage and garbage. Far worse than the Ward; begging lepers at every corner thrusting out their diseased stumps for alms. No, I would not care to paint that."

"As to Gethsemane," he continued. "it is a well cultivated garden, with a walk of stone a few old olive trees and the marks of most reverent care from the Latin Church. Gordon's Calvary—the one outside the city, so called because General Gordon pronounced it to be the real Calvary—is peculiarly interesting. It was Gordon who traced on its rock the resemblance to a human skull. In a garden near by is a tomb, evidently uncompleted, stone rolled away—a beautiful picture."

The Jordan.

Mr. Foster next spoke of the Jordan, winding by a tracery of green through the desert that surrounds the Dead Sea, the rosy, golden glow of the desert common to all the Oriental sands, with shadows of purple and amethyst.

"A peculiar effect of the dense atmosphere at that low level," said Mr. Foster, "is the fact that at a long distance the

silver sheet of the Dead Sea looks close—but it isn't."

Artistic Egypt.

"Now as to Egypt," suggested the reporter.

"The real Promised Land," replied the artist. "There are the myriad toilers in the open fields, the fellahs in their picturesque garbs unchanged for centuries, enhancing atmospheric effects. At evening you get the real poem of that landscape, the vista of the palm-trees, rising into the slender minarets, which lead perhaps 30 miles away into the fallen masses of the pyramids on the skyline. The party unanimously declared that if British control could so make that desert blossom as the rose, what could it not do for Palestine?"

SHOT BEFORE THE ALTAR.

Bridegroom Questioned Man's Relationship to Bride and was Wounded.

New York, May 28.—In the nave of the Roman Catholic Church of the Most Precious Blood, in Baxter street near Canal, last evening, Guglielmo Ruggiero, thirty years old, a musician, living at 219 Mott street, was shot by Giacomo Gerolmini, forty years old, of 214 Canal street. The men quarreled over Camilla Cavallero Ruggiero, twenty-two years old, of 214 Canal street, whom the man who was wounded had married by a civil ceremony last Monday.

Father Bernardino Politz, the pastor, said Gerolmini had gone to the church with Camilla, and Ruggiero was present with several of his relatives. About twenty persons were in the pews. When the priest emerged from the confessional just before 6 o'clock he was approached by Gerolmini, who told of the civil ceremony between Ruggiero and Camilla, and said they wanted to make arrangements for a church ceremony.

Ruggiero suddenly exclaimed in Italian: "That man is not the girl's uncle as he says he is."

"What do you mean?" Gerolmini cried out.

"I mean that I have been deceived and that this girl is not your niece," the younger man is said to have reported.

Then a pistol shot rang out, and Ruggiero fell to the floor. Gerolmini, the bride, and others fled from the church. Camilla and Gerolmini are still missing. Ruggiero had only a flesh wound across the back.

At 214 Canal Street it was learned that Gerolmini and the young woman boarded with a family on the second floor front. They had been there about two months. To the other families in the house they were known as uncle and niece. The girl had been in this country about a year and Gerolmini about five years. After the ceremony at the City Hall, it is said, the girl went back to live with her uncle, pending the church ceremony.
