SEWERAGE.

The Herald will commence tomorrow, the publication of a series of articles on sewerage, and the great necessity that exists for the installation of an effective system in Fredericton, together with other means of securing better sanitary conditions.

The articles are written by a gentleman who has made a special study of the question, and has adequate means of acquainting himself with the subject, and will be entitled to and receive the serious attention of the public.

A POLITICAL JUMPING JACK.

One year ago, six months ago, Mr. Borden and his party were in deadly opposition to government ownership of railways, and if Sir Wilfrid Laurier had proposed that the government should itself undertake the construction of the transcontinental railway throughout its entire length, what a howl would have gone up from the whole of Torydom. The government did not take that course and now nothing is so dear to the Tory heart as government owned railways.

Mr. Borden is so much in love with government ownership, that he declares he will make the question an issue at the next general election, and if his party is returned to power he will cancel the Grand Trunk Pacific railway contract and proceed to build the road himself. These are very brave words, but coming from a man who is not likely to be in the next parliament, they do not count for much.

Mr. Borden, if he ever had the promise of a successful public career has ruined his prospects by his sudden change on a great public question. At first when the new transcontinental railway scheme was mooted, Mr. Borden and those associated with him scorned the idea of building the road. There was absolutely no necessity for it, but as the government plan developed the Tory leader discovered that the people demanded increased railway facilities and a new road across the continent, not only for the development of the west, but to aid the business of the eastern provinces, and he came to the front with an alternative scheme, a crazy quilt proposition, for another transcontinental railway. He wanted to buy the unprofitable part of the C. P. R. from Lake Superior to Winnipeg, lease another part, and leave the Grand Trunk in possession of the proposed western section. The country laughed so heartily at Mr. Borden's proposition that it is not now even mentioned in polite Tory society, and has been as promptly abandoned as Mr. Borden's Liberalism was unloaded when he connected himself with a Halifax Tory law firm that was pocketing big government fees. The alternative proposition has given way to a government owned road from coast to coast in Mr. Borden's plan, and he has thus made two jumps within a year.

Mr. Borden as a politician can never be taken seriously after such kaleidoscopic changes on the railway question, and the best thing Halifax can do for itself and the country is to drop the Tory leader when he next appeals for re-election. He is entirely too small bore a politician to lead a great party and is occupying his present position be-

cause of the poverty of the Tory party in men fitted to direct its affairs in parliament.

TORY SURPRISE.

The Sun seems to think it strange that none of the Tories in Parliament have been bribed to support the Grand Trunk Pacific railway scheme, and breathes a sigh of relief that all danger of such a contingency is past. But why should the Sun fear such a thing. Has it lost confidence in the honesty of its friends in Parliament? Are there men in Mr. Borden's following open to financial or other material inducements to secure their votes on any given question?

The government has carried the scheme by over half a hundred majority, and even if so inclined, had no need of offering bribes to Tory members for their votes. In both chambers of Parliament the solid Liberal contingents voted for the measure, and in doing so were correctly interpreting the desire of the country.

Perhaps the Sun has in mind the gross corruption that characterizes the advent of the Canadian Pacific railway measure during the Tory reign. "Send me another ten thousand" was contained in a telegram from the then Tory chieftain to the gentleman in charge of the Tory bribery fund raised by C. P. R. promoters more than twenty-five years ago, during an exciting election campaign. There are no such scandals in connection with the Liberal administration, and the Sun knowing the inwardness of the Tory party, confesses surprise that no attempt has been made to bribe Tory members of Parliament to support the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme.

The Japs are surrounding Port Arthur, and their capture of Nanshan Hill after a terrific slaughter, gives them the key to the narrow peninsula on which the Russian fortress is located. The city is said to be provisioned for a year, but it is not likely the Japs will give its inmates time to consume that much provender. They will make a dash at the fortress by land and sea, and capture it as they did Nanshan Hill, at the expense of many lives, and its fall may be a question of only a few weeks.

Senator Quay, for many years the Republican boss of Pennsylvania, and very prominent in national politics in the United States, is dead. The deceased was accused in his time by political opponents, with many serious offences against fair dealing in public life, but managed to pull through, and hold his position as Republican leader in his state.

The House of Commons having passed the G. T. Pacific bill after several weeks discussion, is now in a position to deal with other important business. Mr. Fielding will probably make his budget speech some time next week. It is probable that the session will be concluded by the first of August.

The Tory organs are scarcely done trying to explain away the separation of Mr. J. H. Haslam, a prominent Manitobaan, from the Tory party, when the announcement is made that Mr. H. A. Mullins, a Tory ex-member of the Manitoba legislature, has abandoned Toryism and will support Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

NARROW ESCAPE.

Two Young Men in Danger of Their Lives.

Sun: A second boating tragedy came near taking place at Millidgeville Saturday afternoon, when G. McG. Hall of the Bank of Montreal, and a companion named Spears, were precipitated into the water from a small boat in which they had been sailing, and after a rather trying experience were rescued by the str. Clifton.

It was the same old story of a small open boat, large sail and sudden squall.

About three o'clock in the afternoon the two men started out and when about half-way between Millidgeville and Milkish, a strong gust rolled the boat over, upsetting her completely before the occupants could do any thing to save themselves. They succeeded in climbing on to the bottom of the overturned boat where they remained until sighted by the Clifton, which picked them up.

The men were quite a distance from shore when the accident occurred and had a narrow escape. The boat did not belong to the yacht club, but was a small one owned by private parties.
