MAN BECAME EXHAUSTED IN BLINDING SNOW-STORM

And Was Left to Die--- Body Found Frozen Stiff.

(Special to Daily Herald.)
Vancouver, May 30.—Mr. Williams, a Vancouver man, just returned from West Alaska, brings a tale of fearful hardship in the north, which resulted in the death of F. Stevens of Seattle.
The later and a companion tried to reach a cabin on Yakatiki Beach, and two miles from the nearest settlement they were caught by a blinding snowstorm, lost their way, and wandered for hours.
Finally Stevens refused to go further, and asked his companion to cover him with snow so he could die in comfort.
For a time the latter carried the dying man in his arms, but in turn became exhausted, and finally gave up the task as hopeless. Stevens all the time begging to be buried so as to escape the biting cold blasts.
At last in despair his companion granted Stevens' prayers, and the latter was left to die. A week later the body was found frozen stiff.

FISHERMAN DROWNED.

Fred H. Emmerson Lost His Life in the Gulf.

North Sydney, N.S., May 30.—The schooner Lala D. Young, Capt. Hemmeon, which arrived here yesterday, reports the loss of one of her crew, Fred H. Emmerson, who was drowned Saturday, forty miles off Entry island, Magdalens.
The accident occurred as the schooner was picking up a dory containing Hemmeon.
The deceased belonged to Lunenburg where his parents reside, and was twenty-two years of age.

BUILDING COLLAPSED.
