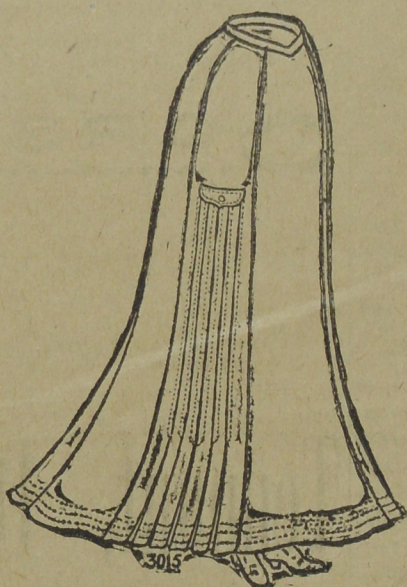

THIS IS RELIABLE.

Crop Reports Show That West is All Right.

Winnipeg, July 16.—Crop advices continue most optimistic. The weather for the past two days has been most favorable, showers and very high temperature prevailing throughout the west. The following reports are from accredited correspondents:

Wapella, Assa.—The recent rain have done much good to the crops. Wheat is heading out well, and the prospects are very bright for good harvest.

Hartney.—On the Souris Plains the crops never looked better at this time of the year. There are on exhibition many samples of wheat stalks four feet in length and fully headed out. The farmers are all delighted with the prospects. The recent heavy rains came just in time to cause assurance of the perfect development of the grain. On many farms the wheat was headed out during the first week of July, and on each field binders are expected to be at work before the middle of August.

Newdale.—The drought was broken by a heavy rain Wednesday night, which was badly needed. Crops will now do well.
