The Legislature put in a good day's work yesterday discussing the details of the new highway bill, which is destined to work very desirable changes in the system of handling the road business in New Brunswick.

The local opposition press grasped at the charge of some \$900 fees for settling succession duties, and proceeded to criticize Dr. Pagsley for making a big profit out of the matter, but the attorney general was able to show that more than half the amount went to other parties for services in connection with the collections.

The debate on the address in parliament opened with some spirited speeches from both sides. Mr. Grant, who moved the address, is the young man who defeated Mr. Foster in North Ontario, and the constituency apparently showed wisdom in its choice. Mr. Borden was of course critical as becomes an opposition leader, but was fully answered on all points by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who is enjoying unusual physical vigor. His reply to Tory jabs over the result of the bye elections, was a masterpiece, and his defence of the appointment of Mr. Blair as chairman of the railway commission, was made on broad grounds, the ex-minister's special fitness for the position.

The chief surprise in the civic elections was the defeat of the veteran Ald. Moore, who had been a member of the council continuously for some fifteen years. Perhaps his rather extreme conservatism had something to do with the result. The new men, Alds. Everett, Barbour, McKnight, and Jewett should be able to give satisfactory service. They are all respectable men with a substantial interest in the city. Ald. Farrell took up at the head of the poll, showing that the citizens appreciate the faithful service he has rendered for twenty years at the council board. Alds. Edwards, Scott, Stockford, Ross and Maxwell have given much attention to their civic duties, and must be well satisfied with the endorsement they have received.

'P. S. (unofficially)—What do Japanese eat? We are large eaters of wheat, butter cheese, beet yellow. Consult Strathcona."

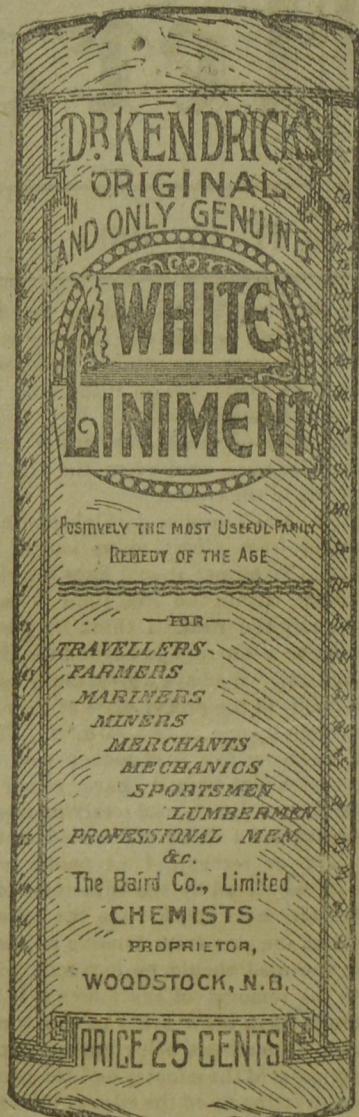
Taken to St. John.

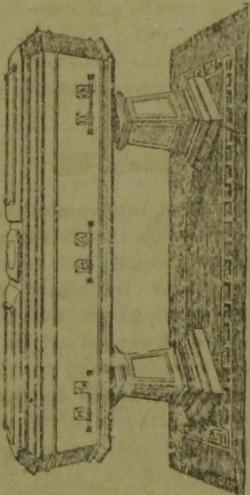
