

## A PLUCKY JAP.

### Who Jumped Aboard a Russian Warship.

### ENGAGED AN OFFICER AND SLEW HIM.

### Dead and Wounded in the Last Naval Fight.

### RUSSIAN FLEET BELIEVED TO HAVE LEFT PORT ARTHUR.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, March 15.—The report circulated that the Russians had sunk four merchantmen steamers at entrance to Port Arthur, with intention of blocking the harbor, is authoritatively denied here.

#### Where is Russian Fleet?

Tokio, March 15.—It is strongly believed here that the Russian fleet has abandoned Port Arthur and is endeavoring to make a junction with the Vladivostok fleet.

Confirmation of this movement is not obtainable from any reliable source, but recent scouting in the vicinity of Port Arthur failed to reveal the presence of any Russian warships.

#### A Personal Encounter.

Tokio, March 15.—A steamer bearing ten wounded and the bodies of nine of the seamen who were killed in the Port Arthur fight on the 10th inst. has reached Sasebo.

The wounded and dead are chiefly the participants in the battle between the Japanese and Russian torpedo boat destroyers.

The survivors unite in praising the desperately heroic attack on the Russians, and tell a story of personal encounter between a Japanese sailor and captain of the Russian destroyer, Stereguschitchi.

When the Japanese closed on the Russians, a Japanese sailor sprang aboard the Russian craft. The sailor and captain sprang at each other, but the seaman was the quicker of the two and felled the Russian officer by striking him on the head with a cutlass. The Russian endeavored to rise, but the Japanese sailor kicked him overboard and he was drowned.

The Japanese say there were 22 dead on two Russian destroyers. The report of the death of Engineer Minamisawa was premature. He is very low.

The Japanese dead were landed at Sasebo, and received with full military honors. They were borne on gun carriages to the naval brigade headquarters.

## GOV'T DEFEATED

### On a Snap Vote in the Imperial House of Commons.

### AFFAIR WAS ENGINEERED BY THE IRISH LEADER

### But Balfour and His Col- leagues will not Resign.

London, March 15.—The government was defeated in the House of Commons this afternoon by 125 to 130 on a vote on a motion of John Redmond, the Irish leader, for a reduction of the Irish educational estimates.

As it was in the nature of a snap division, engineered by the Nationalists, the government is not likely to resign, but it is regarded as another straw showing the direction of the wind.

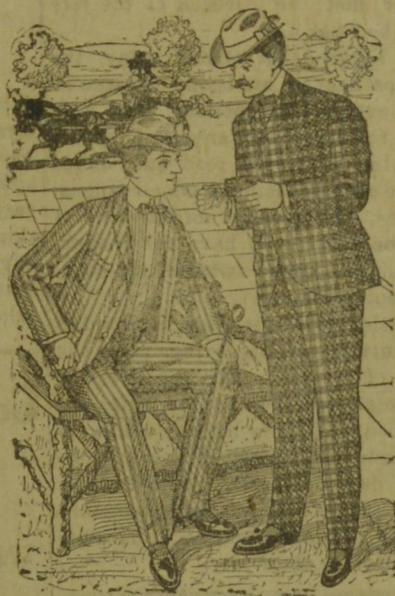
