living or dead. He owned an expensive stud of five different breeds, and each year held an auction sale that the people might receive the benefit of his experience. The horse for the farmers to breed in this country is undoubtedly the heavy draft horse. He can be used when two years old, and will give a longer and better service than other horse. Why not make a Canadian draft horse, from a cross between the Clyde and Shire, and make known all over the world that it was a Canadian horse. The good qualities of the Clyde and Shire combined would make the best horse in the world. If they did not do that he would advise them to make this district celebrated for one class of horse. It is most important when breeding to pay every attention to soundness, and look out for hereditary diseases. If your mare is unsound sell her to a non-breeder and get another. Don't use the cheap stallions as in most cases they are unsound, and therefore dear at any price. An animal should be taught that what he feels won't hurt him, what he sees won't hurt him and what he hears and what he smells won't hurt him, then you will have him half broken. Always look to the feet of a foal, and have them pared occasionally. There are lots of good stallions in this country, but a scarcity of good mares. If he could get the government to help him he would undertake to deliver pure bred Clyde mares in Fredericton for less than \$100 each. The Argentine Republic raised large number of Clyde horses, and were ready to sell them at \$45 each. He knew of one man who has seven thousand of them. He hoped Mr. Peters would convey this message to the minister of agriculture.

Mr. Peters—The lieutenant governor wishes me to state that he will take twenty of them on arrival at that price.

Mr. Spark—Then I can say that he will have the horses within a year. The speaker thought the plenitude of these horses in the Argentine Republic, would not be the means of keeping the price down in this country. He had seen photographs of these horses and knew them to be all right. They were kept only for breeding purposes, and not broken to harness, but could be very easily trained as the Clyde is naturally a quiet horse. The best type of stallion he had seen in Canada was a Clyde in Toronto, afterwards purchased by Mr. Rogers, the president of this association. He was quite sure that the people of the Argentine would rather trade with Canada than the United States. If you want a good class of carriage horse breed the hackney stallion with the standard bred male; a combination of these breeds, would certainly produce the best results. His advice to them was to keep their stables light and airy and give the horses plenty of sunlight, which is most important for both man and beast. It is important that a horse should be well groomed, but never use a curry comb on a horse's back for it is only intended to take the dust out of the brush. It will pay in the long run to groom a horse well, and a well groomed horse generally indicates a smart man. He did not think any harm resulted from docking a horse's tail while the animal is young, but it was cruelty in the case of a full grown animal. In this country, where the weather is hot, he believed a horse had use for his tail. In regard to the Percheron, he liked it in Paris, but not in Canada. His blood did not seem to mix with that of the Clyde and Shire.

Mr. Spark showed a number of views of Clyde, Shire, thoroughbreds and hackney horses, and explained their strong and weak points in an entertaining manner, showing a perfect mastery of his subject. In conclusion he returned thanks for the patient hearing and resumed his seat amidst applause.

A brief discussion led by the veteran Donald Jones, a progressive farmer from Kipcardine, followed Mr. Spark's address. Mr. Duncan Anderson of Rugby, Ont., spoke briefly in response to a call from the chair and gave some valuable advice in regard to the feeding and care of horses.

After a vocal selection by Mr. Fawcett of Sackville, the meeting adjourned.

HALE AND HEARTY AT CENTURY MARK.

Mrs. Duncan McIntyre, of Roxborough Township, Stormont, was Born in 1804.

Morrisburg, Ont., March 19.—Senior Wark is not the only Canadian who has recently made a century run in the race of life. Another long-distance runner is Mrs. Duncan McIntyre, of Roxborough Township, Stormont County, who, on Thursday last, passed the hundredth mile post, having been born in Inverness, Scotland, in 1804. When fourteen years of age she came to this country with her parents, who settled near Martintown, Glengary County. In 1826, the year of her mother's death, she married Duncan McIntyre, the ceremony being performed by the Rev. Mr. Johnston, then located in Cornwall. Three years later Mr. and Mrs. McIntyre moved from Finch, where they took up their residence after their marriage, to what is now the homestead, in Roxborough. Here fourteen children were born to them, seven of whom are living. In 1884 Mr. McIntyre passed away age 84 years.

Mrs. McIntyre, notwithstanding her great age, is enjoying good health, and her mind is as clear as for many years back. She has never worn glasses, and can read the finest print. She is able to go around her dwelling, and is always ready to welcome her old friends, with whom she takes great pleasure in conversing about times long gone by. Mrs. McIntyre is a strict adherent of the Presbyterian Church, and an exemplary Christian lady. It evidently becomes natural for her to live so long, her father having lived to 93, and her grandfather to 104.
