Weather Forecast.

The extremely cold weather of the past season froze the trees up solidly and they are only now commencing to thaw out. A few days of bright sunshine, however, is sure to start the sap running.

It was chased out by some boys, and taking refuge in a crevice near the cellar wall, successfully repelled all efforts to dislodge it for some time, but was finally routed, without disastrous results to anybody.

A Popular Lecturer.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEES.

Public Accounts and Various Bills Considered at this Morning's Sessions.

The public accounts committee met at eleven o'clock this morning. All the members were present except Mr. Smith of Carleton who was called home by the destruction of his property by fire.

Mr. Quinton in reply to Mr. Morrison defined his duties as steward of the asylum. The committee had finished with Mr.

The Bathurst Electric and Water Power Company bill was taken up and the promoters, Messrs. P. J. Veniot, ex-M. P. P. N. A. Landry and John A. Legere, were heard in support of the bill. After some discussion regarding the clause of the bill relating to expropriations the committee adjourned until tomorrow morning when the matter will be again taken up.

Municipalities.

The bill relating to the Grand Falls Water and Power Co., was taken up before the municipalities committee, Mr. Allen in the chair. The bill was recommended to the House with unimportant amendments.

The bill providing for the erection of an engine house in St. John, west, was passed without discussion.

After the first sound of the whistle the players were into it "hammer and tonge," both teams seemed determined to win. The Trojans seemed to have the advantage in the first half and played harder, their combination work was excellent, while the rushes of the different players surpassed anything seen in Fredericton for some time.

After about four minutes play Coleman shot a goal from a pass by Rowan.

When Fredericton scored the Marysville boys seemed to wake up and played much faster, and kept the Trojans' defence guessing. The half ended with the puck in the centre of the ice.

Second Half.

At 9.20 the boys started off at a lightning pace, each team trying to outdo the other. In this half Marysville showed up better than their opponents and played much faster. Every man played his position well, especially Cain, Inch and Black for the Crescents, and Coleman, McManiman and Sandy Staples for the Trojans.

When time was nearly up Cain got the puck and with a rush from cover point reached the Trojans' territory and shot the only goal for his team, thus making the score a tie.

The admirers of the Marysville team claim that the goal made by Fredericton was an off side play and that they were expecting the whistle to blow and therefore were off their guard.

For some reason the game was allowed to remain a tie, its end of playing over time as has been the custom. The spectators were not a little disappointed at the result, as they expected to see a finished game, but as it is, the public can not say which is the better team.
