GIROUARD'S POSITION.

A Select Committee Recommends Some Changes.

London, June 13.—The majority report of the select committee of the Intercolonial Council on the railway question recommends the retention of the Commissioner of Railways at Pretoria, but proposes to relieve him of the responsibility of the financial management. The minority report, signed by Sir J. Farrer and Mr. Hoskin, recommends the abolition of the commissionership and the substitution of a financial controller, aided by a board. A lively debate is expected on Monday.

The Times' Johannesburg correspondent wires that the retirement of Sir Percy Girouard at the present juncture would entail no reflection upon the qualities which have raised this able officer to his prominent position. His appointment to carry on the work he initiated at the close of the war was not only fully justified, but was absolutely the only possible selection open to Lord Milner. The work now accomplished only enhances Sir Percy's reputation. The war used up most of the available rolling stock, and the task of coping with the immediate rush of traffic following the war entailed certain extravagances. In view of the financial depression it is the right of the colony to insist upon its own financial administration, and the fact that Sir Percy Girouard endorses the findings of the majority report proves that he himself recognizes it.

THE QUEEN'S GIFT.

Pearls and Diamonds for Vecsey, the Boy Violinist.

New York, June 12.—The Herald today has the following from London:—Franz Vecsey, the child violinist, who has taken London by storm scored one of his greatest triumphs at the State concert given on Thursday night at Buckingham Palace in honor of the Archduke Frederick, who this week has been returning on behalf of the Emperor Francis Joseph, the visit which King Edward paid to Vienna last year.

When Vecsey had finished playing Queen Alexandra, who is passionately fond of music, went up to him and hugged and kissed him, and then taking from her own neck the string of pearls and diamonds which she had worn for years, she wound it around the boy's throat. Later, at supper time, the Queen took young Vecsey to the buffet and herself waited upon him, picking out the delicacies which she considered would most appeal to his childish palate.
