

FIGHT IN A FOG.

Russians Repulsed by the Plucky Japs.

BRITISH STEAMER DETAINED AND SEARCHED.

By Russian Warships.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Tokio, July 18.—General Kuroki reports that at 3 o'clock Sunday morning, during a heavy fog, two divisions of Russians commanded by Lieut.-General Keller, made an assault upon the Japanese position at Motien Pass, and in its vicinity, but were repulsed.

The Japanese troops pursued them a considerable distance. General Kuroki does not mention casualties.

Aden Arabia, July 18.—The British Steamer Persia, was forcibly detained for an hour in the Red Sea by the Russian's volunteer fleet steamer Smolensk, which transferred to the Persia a portion of the Japanese mails and seized one of the German Lloyd steamers Prinz Heinrich, July 15. The Smolensk confiscated two bags of the Prinz Heinrich's mails destined for Nagasaki.

Negotiations for Government Purchase of Canada Atlantic Railway.

Hamilton, Ont., July 18.—The chairman and board of investigation of Royal Canadian Humane Ass., have awarded medals to Grace Ayre, of Westmount, Montreal, and Annie McLean, of Woodbridge, Ont., for their presence of mind and conspicuous courage in saving Willie Elder from drowning in the Humber river on June 18th, 1904, and medals to Alan Gilmour of Brockville, a student in Upper Canada College, and James Alexander and Stewart Burgess, of Elizabethtown, also a student, for conspicuous courage and presence of mind in saving J. H. Botsford from drowning in the St. Lawrence river at Brockville, July 7.

PRIEST'S SUDDEN DEATH.

New York, July 18.—Very Rev. Stephen Kealy, provincial of the Passion Order in the United States dropped dead yesterday while celebrating mass in a monastery at West Hoboken. He was stricken with apoplexy and fell on the altar steps dying almost instantly. He preached yesterday from the text "Render an account of thy stewardship." Father Kealy was born in Ireland, September 22, 1848, and celebrated his silver jubilee of his ordination a year ago.

LIKED GOLD BRICK.

Sharp Game Worked on a Young Englishman at St. Mary's.

A young Englishman, named Robert Smith, residing in St. Marys, claims to have been victimized on the gold brick principle by a man named Dennison at St. Marys on Saturday. It appears that Dennison represented to Smith that he had a bicycle which he was willing to dispose of at a sacrifice, and Smith was induced to accompany him to McPherson's machine shop where the wheel had been left for repairs. After examining the wheel, which Dennison claimed was his, Smith agreed to buy it for \$8, and taking Dennison to his home, paid him the money and took a receipt for it.

Later on Smith again visited the repair shop to claim the wheel, and was surprised to learn that it did not belong to Dennison at all, but was the property of his brother, and further, that there was a bill of \$5 for work and storage, standing against it. Smith, on receiving this surprising intelligence set out to look for Dennison, but thus far has not located him, and the general opinion is that he has pulled up stakes and left the place. The case has been placed in the hands of the police and they are now assisting in the search for the absentee. Dennison will be remembered as the same individual who figured in a rather sensational law suit with the C. P. R. a few years ago.

Seventy-Eight Miles an Hour.

The Michigan Central Railway recently made a world's record for fast runs on steam railways, knocking out all previous records. President Ledyard, of the Michigan Central, and President Newman, of the New York Central, passed over the Michigan Central, en route from New York to Chicago, on a special train of one baggage and three private cars. From Niagara Falls to St. Thomas, 115 miles, the time was 97 minutes. On the west end it took twelve minutes and thirty seconds to reach Shedd, owing to slowing up through the city and for the bridge. Windsor, 111 miles, was made in 94 minutes, 30 seconds. From Shedd to Essex, 86 28.100 miles, the run was made in 66 minutes, or 78 53.00 miles an hour. On the east division, where from Perry it is uphill, 91 59.100 miles, was run in 73 minutes, at the rate of 75 48.100 miles an hour.

How to Save Gas Bills.

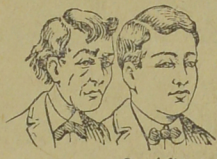
