

WAS IT FOUL PLAY?

Suspicious Aroused that
There Might Have Been
Crooked Work

IN MISS DUNCAN'S DEATH

Officers Went to Lower
Pokiok to make Enquiry.

INQUEST TO BE HELD HERE
TUESDAY.

Suspicious having been aroused as to the cause of the death of Miss Mary Duncan, a domestic employed at the residence of Dr. L. W. Bailey, University avenue, Attorney General Pugsley, at the suggestion of Clerk of the Peace Rainsford, has ordered an investigation. Miss Duncan was ill for only a short time and was reported to have passed away of heart disease. Her remains were taken to her former home at Lower Pokiok, parish of Dumfries, on Thursday, for interment, being accompanied by her alleged fiancé, Hospital Sergt. MacCaulay, of the R.C.R. Meantime rumors of foul play having been freely circulated, the clerk of the peace felt called upon to act, and hence his information to the attorney general, and the latter's ordering of an investigation. It is stated that Miss Duncan came to her death from the result of a criminal operation, and yesterday morning Dr. G. J. McNally, coroner, accompanied by Dr. McGrath and Constable Roberts left for Lower Pokiok to make an investigation. A post mortem examination was to be made by Dr. McGrath, and if the circumstances warranted it, Coroner McNally intended empanelling a jury who, after viewing the body would hear the evidence in this city.

Enquiry at the city clerk's office today elicited the information that when application was made for a burial permit, for the deceased the cause of death was not given, the applicant stating that the physician who attended Miss Duncan was out of town, and the usual certificate for that purpose could not be obtained.

Dr. Crockett is the Bailey family physician and was called to see Miss Duncan in her illness, but he declined to talk of the case except to say that undertaker Geo. W. Adams had telephoned him for a certificate of death, but he was absent from home at the time.

Coroner McNally, Dr. McGrath and Constable Roberts, returned at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The party had a very hard trip. The roads are in a bad condition. It took them seven and a half hours to make the return trip.

Coroner McNally in conversation with The Herald this afternoon recounted the steps he had taken in the discharge of his official duty. Before starting on the trip he sent word to the Duncan family to postpone the funeral until his arrival and this was done.

On arriving at the stricken household, the coroner empanelled a jury as follows: Coun. McGirr, foreman; Wm. A. Frazer, Jas. King, Hugh Scott, Andrew Parker, Frank Scott, William F. Fraser.

The jury viewed the body and the coroner adjourned the inquest till Tuesday afternoon in this city, all the witnesses residing here.

Dr. McNally then ordered Dr. McGrath to make a post mortem examination of the body, the latter performed that duty this morning, and the remains were interred this afternoon.

That was all the information the coroner had for the press on the subject.

Dr. McGrath quite properly declined to impart the result of the post mortem, and it will not be known until he gives evidence at the inquest.

Mr. McCaulay also returned this afternoon from Lower Pokiok.

MR. QUINN DEAD.

Oldtime Merchant of
Fredericton

PASSED AWAY AFTER A
LONG ILLNESS.

Came Here as an Infant
From Queens Co.

The death occurred at his residence corner of Brunswick and Westmorland streets at seven o'clock this morning of Mr. William H. Quinn in the 77th year of his age.

Mr. Quinn was a native of this province having been born in Queens county on May 1st 1827. He came to Fredericton with his parents when only an infant and has resided here ever since.

Mr. Quinn married Jane Brandon in 1849 and they had two children, William and Mary. William, who was a practicing barrister, died about twelve years ago, and Mrs. Quinn on Oct. 12, 1892. Miss Mary Quinn is still living and has always resided with her father.

Mr. Quinn began business in the fall of 1849 and has been very successful. He was the oldest grocer in this city and one of the oldest merchants, having been constantly in business for the past fifty-five years, and there are very few men now doing business that were at the time Mr. Quinn started.

The deceased was a staunch member of the Anglican church and has been thirty years vestryman of St. Ann's and was also trustee of the Church Hall. He has been in failing health for the past two years and of late has been a great sufferer, being confined to his bed the past six weeks, where he was lovingly waited upon by his daughter and grandson Willie, who has always made his home with his grandfather.

The funeral will take place from his late residence at 3 o'clock, Monday afternoon, with services at St. Ann's church. Interment at the old burial ground, Brunswick street. Mr. John G. Adams in charge.
