The Potato Market.

Potatoes are now worth from \$1.75 to \$1.90 in the local market, and are being eagerly bought for shipment to Boston. There were several wagon loads in the market this morning and most of them were bought at \$1.80 per barrel by shippers. There is a brisk demand for potatoes in the American market this season and notwithstanding the duty of 25 cents a bushel with which they have to con-

tend, local shippers have been coining money. It is estimated that about fifteen thousand barrels have been sent forward from this city.

Butter in rolls has also come down to 20 cents per pound and seems to be quite plentiful at that figure. There were some nice carcasses of veal sold this morning at 5 and 6 cents per pound, but no beef or lamb. Potatoes all still very scarce and command an excessive price.

Mr. Samuel Smith, a well known resident of Crock's Point, parish of Bright died last night after a lingering illness from haasty consumption. He was sixty-nine years of age, and is a bachelor. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.
