## ST. JOHN TORY NOMINATION.

None of the alleged strong men in the Tory party in St. John cared to face Hon. H. A. McKeown in the contest for the vacant seat in the House of Commons, as the party have put up Dr. J. W. Daniel to lead the forlorn hope and to be snowed under on the 16th of February.

Efforts were made to induce W. H. Thorne, Mayor White, Mr. Foster, Mr. W. S. Fisher and Dr. Stockton to accept nomination, but they declined, and Dr. Daniel rushes in where angels (?) feared to tread. The Tory nominee is a very respectable and amiable gentleman, son of the late Dr. Daniel, a much revered Methodist clergyman, but he is seeking to make an entrance into political life at a very inopportune time, and against a very strong and popular candidate.

At no time in its history has St. John been more anxious for government favor than now. Its winter port business, fostered by the Liberal government, has outgrown the facilities for handling it, and further accommodation must be afforded if the business is to be extended. The city is looking to the government for assistance in the very desirable and necessary extension of its facilities for handling the trade, and the electors are scarcely prepared to administer a slap in the mouth to an administration that is declared itself ready to co-operate in the proposed increase of terminal facilities. The government has already ordered its dredges to work in St. John for the purpose of assisting the port, and under all the circumstances, the St. John Conservatives, if loyal to their city, should have permitted the government's candidate an unopposed return. It is only a bye election anyway, the government is firmly entrenched in power, and the return of Mr. McKeown is assured. The Tory machine, however, with a mistaken idea of its own importance and strength, has challenged a combat, and it is the duty of the Liberals to take off their coats and give the machine a thoroughly good drubbing.

## SYMPATHY FOR MONK.

Liberals as well as the more self-respecting Conservatives will sympathize with Mr. Monk, M. P., in the position which he feels bound to assume with respect to the ascendancy permitted to Mr. Tarte in the councils of the Tory party in Quebec. Mr. Monk has been the Tory leader in that province since 1896, and has worked hard for the success of his party. He has been active in parliament and on the stump all over the country, and now to find himself practically supplanted by the erratic Tarte is more than Mr. Monk's proud spirit can tolerate. The only course for him was to resign his empty title, and this he has done, although the pretension is made until the bye elections are over that Mr. Monk retains his position.

Mr. Tarte tried to wreck the Liberal party from the inside, but he was detected, was flung out of the cabinet before his scheme was properly organized, and he is already causing trouble among his new political associates. The Tories are welcome to the hot-headed little agitator, whose itch for notoriety outweighs his judgment, and embarrasses his political associates.

The Montreal mayoralty was captured by Mr. Laforce, who defeated Mayor Cochran by over 14,000 and Mr. Dan-durand by more than 12,000 votes. The mayor-elect had the unqualified support of the leading newspapers of Montreal.

## COUNCIL WILL ACT.

The Herald learns with much satisfaction that the city council at its meeting this evening will probably act on the suggestion made in these columns yesterday, with respect to tendering Hon. Senator Wark some sort of recognition of the approaching one hundredth anniversary of his birth. The Herald's suggestion has been well received by members of the council and the citizens generally, and with the Senator's permission, it is understood the council will present him with an appreciative address, prominent citizens outside of the council also being invited to take part in the pleasant affair.

The annual meeting of the Farmers' and Dairyman's Association to be held in this city next month promises to be a gathering of great interest to the men of the country engaged in agricultural pursuits. The executive committee have been able to arrange a very strong and attractive programme, and no doubt the attendance will be large. It is hoped that the association will have no cause to complain of the frigidity of the hall in which they meet, as was the case two years ago.

The Ontario legislature has been in session nearly three weeks, and the Ross government is still in power. After the Tory triumph in North Renfrew, Mr. Whitney and his friends demanded the dismissal of the ministry, but the governor instead called the House to meet for the transaction of business and Premier Ross and his colleagues are still in the saddle, secure in power even though their majority is only three.

The erratic Telegraph under the Russell management is more Tory than Liberal, while claiming to be independent. It gives the St. John Tory candidate an unexceptional certificate of character, but its praise of Mr. McKeown is still to be uttered. The Telegraph is in league with the enemies of the Liberal party, and deserves no quarter from the friends of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Such eminent and consistent Conservatives as Dr. Stockton, Dr. Alward and Mr. Geo. V. MacInerney were among the speakers who applauded the Tory machine's selection of Dr. Daniel as a candidate for the St. John vacant seat in parliament.

It is rather a remarkable coincidence that both the parliamentary candidate in St. John are sons of Methodist ministers. The new minister of railways is also the son of a clergyman, but he was a Baptist.

Senator Wark was in public life six years before the new minister of railways was born, and the venerable gentleman was past middle life when Mr. Emmerson made his appearance on this sphere.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Hon. H. A. McKeown and Mr. E. M. Macdonald, M. P., the Liberal candidate for the House of Commons in Pictou, are to address a big Liberal rally at St. John this evening.

Mr. D. A. Cartwright, barrister, of Toronto, son of Sir Richard Cartwright, has been appointed secretary of the railway commission.

Hon. Dr. McInnis, ex-governor of British Columbia, is critically ill of heart disease at Vancouver. He is a native of Cape Breton.

Leading Liberals of York should make it a point to attend the provincial Liberal convention to be held at St. John Feb. 11.

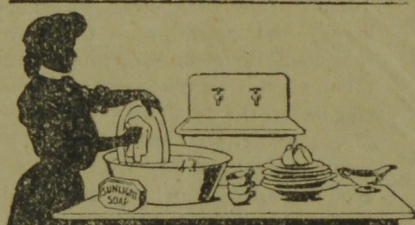
