Four Prominent Young Men Met Death

WHILE ENJOYING A SUNDAY SAIL.

Upturned Boat Evidence of the Tragedy.

Collingwood, Ont., June 13.—Harvey Stephens, son of C. E. Stephens, merchant of Collingwood, Gerald Mussen, son of Rev. E. H. Mussen, English Church minister of Collingwood, Harry Andrews, son of S. D. Andrews, of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Co., and Egmont Carrol, teller of the Bank of Toronto here, son of Rev. W. E. Carrol, of Bowmanville, Ont., started in a sailboat to spend Sunday at a cottage on the Nottawasaga river.

On Sunday the boat drifted into the water works station full of water and the young men are probably drowned.

SIR PERCY CRITICISED.

Canadian Officer May Have to Resign His Position but He'll Fight First.

London, June 13.—Sir Percy Girouard, the Canadian who intended to resign the Commissionership of the Transvaal Railways, owing to criticisms of extravagance in his department, has now decided to put his back to the wall in consequence of the announcement that his position has become untenable.

The African World says: "The demand for Sir Percy Girouard's removal must be complied with sooner or later. Girouard is a brilliant soldier, but he has provided another illustration of the ancient truth that a man most capable in war is sometimes most incapable in peace. When Girouard took up his civilian role he was as much out of his element as a fish out of water. Nobody realizes this more fully than himself. Many other branches of activity are open to him and in one of these we are sure he is yet destined to shine."

IN A TRAP.

Japs Set One for Enemy and Killed 800 of Them.

Port Arthur, was attacked south east of Shungmac.

The Russian losses are placed at 800 men.

Then they fell back on Kila Chou and began to retreat along the Baimatgu road.
