

TWO MURDERS.

Committed in Nova Scotia on Sunday.

SON KILLED HIS FATHER AT GLACE BAY.

Both Tragedies Result of Drink.

Halifax, June 12.—Herbert Parr was shot and killed early this morning by Albert Brady in a shack with a bad reputation, back of Rockingham, five miles from Halifax. Brady and another man left Halifax at midnight to spend Sunday fishing in Carney's Lake. They reached the shack at the foot of the lake and entered it. Soon four other men came along, one of this group being Parr. He also went into the shack, where he found Brady. A pistol was lying on the bench. Brady says that he did not know it was loaded. It went off in his hands, the bullet striking Parr in the forehead so that he fell dead. There was suspicious circumstances connected with the affair, however, and Brady is under arrest. His story is contradicted by Cody, who keeps the shack, and who was very drunk when the police arrested Brady. The coroner's verdict was death from a revolver in the hands of Albert Brady.

At Glace Bay.

The second tragedy in Nova Scotia today and the third murder within 18 months in Glace Bay, C. B., took place this morning at that town when John McRae struck his father, killing him. He is now under arrest charged with murder. The deed occurred in a saloon kept by the son. A Richie McOdum, who was in the bar room when the tragedy occurred, gave your correspondent the following story of the affair:

"Jack's father came into the bar. He went to the bar and said: 'Jack you've got twenty dollars of my money here, I want it.'"

"Jack would not give him the money and they got into a scuffle. I interfered and told Jack he should not beat his father. After this Jack started at the old man again. He struck him on the jaw. I saw him fall, striking his head on the handle of a lifting machine. He then got up and they scuffled out towards the hallway in front of the bar. Jack came back and in a minute or so Field, the bartender, went out and returning, said: 'Jack, the old man is dead.'"

"Jack and some others went out and drew the old man in nearer the door and tried to bring him to. They sent Field, the bar tender, out after a doctor, but before the doctor got there the old man had died. The police came in and arrested all hands."

The immediate cause of death was the formation of a clot of blood at the base of the brain, due to a blow received on the jaw, which was broken. The murdered man belonged in South Port, P. E. I., and had a wife and six children dependent on him.
