THE LATE JOHN P. McKEEN.

Remains Arrive Here and Are Interred in Rural Cemetery.

The remains of the late John P. McKeen, whose sudden death in the Tobique woods on Friday has already been reported in these columns, arrived here by the late train last evening, being accompanied from Grand Falls by his daughter, Miss Edith McKeen. The funeral took place at three o'clock this afternoon from the residence of Mr. W. Tom Murchie,

son-in-law of the deceased, and in spite of the cold weather was largely attended. An impressive service was conducted at the house by Rev. Willard Macdonald, and interment was made in the rural cemetery. The list of mourners included Messrs. W. Tom Murchie, W. A. Estabrooke, Ald. Geo. Ross, G. Fred Whittaker, Chas. Whittaker, Fred Ross and John Johnson. Undertaker John G. Adams had charge of the funeral arrangements.

As already stated in these columns Mr. McKeen's death was due to heart trouble and was sudden and unexpected. At four o'clock on Friday afternoon he was attending to his work as usual and there was nothing to indicate that he was not in the enjoyment of good health. Shortly afterwards he was taken ill, and although everything possible was done with the means at hand to alleviate his suffering, he sank rapidly and before midnight passed away.

THE HANSON CASE.

Dismissed by Col. Marsh at the Police Court this Morning.

The assault case of A. E. Hanson vs. Policemen Rideout and King was dismissed by Col. Marsh at the police court this morning. In delivering judgment His Honor went very fully into the circumstances of the case, which he referred to as being of rather a trivial nature, and he gave some good advice to both the complainant and defendants. He said that he had made up his mind to have nothing to do with another charge preferred against the policemen, because the parties making the complaint had seen fit to go to the members of the police committee instead of to him. In trying the assault case he had dealt with the policemen as if they were ordinary citizens, and had found that there was not sufficient evidence to convict them of the charge preferred by Mr. Hanson. The policemen, he said, had no legal right to enter the rink, and should not have gone there unless sent for. The policemen should be very careful in interfering with the rights of private citizens. If at any time a doubt should arise in their minds in regard to their duties they should consult with the police magistrate as head of the force. If they acted upon his advice he was perfectly willing to assume all responsibility, but not otherwise.

In regard to the trouble at the rink His Honor thought it rather singular that it should have occurred, just after Mr. Hanson had been fined, on the complaint of the policemen for fast driving on the public streets. Prior to that he had raised no objection to the presence of the policemen at the rink. Considering all the circumstances His Honor felt that his only course was to dismiss the case, without costs.

Mr. Hanson, when seen this morning, expressed himself as perfectly satisfied with the outcome of the case. It was not his wish that the policemen should be fined—all he wanted was that they could not interfere with his rights as a citizen with impunity.

Visitors From Hoboville.

No less than five men, all strangers, were given protection at the police station last night. On being released this morning they thanked the policeman for their hospitality, and remarked that the police station of Fredericton was the most homelike and comfortable places that they had ever slept in. Three of the party stated that they were endeavoring to work their way to Quebec. The others had no fixed destination other than that of the ordinary hobo, which is to steer clear of anything resembling work.

Lively Runaway.

A horse attached to a sleigh and owned by a Marysville man, took fright and ran away on York street this afternoon. The animal turned the corner at Staples drug store, and dashed down King and in Carlton street. It tried to get on to the highway bridge, but some boards across the entrance proved an effective barrier, and it bolted up Campbell street and cut York to Golding's stable, where a capture was effected. Strange to say the rig suffered no damage.
