

RUSSIANS HOPEFUL.

Stoessel Thinks He Can Hold Out at Port Arthur.

SECOND DIVISION RUSSIAN BALTIC SQUADRON

Starts for the far East Shadowed by British Ships.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Simonstown, Cape Colony, Nov. 19.—The British cruiser, Barrosa, sailed this morning to Faldish Bay, to watch the approach of the second Russian Pacific squadron.

Falkberg, Denmark, Nov. 19.—The second division of the Russian Baltic squadron sailed northward this morning.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 19.—Negotiations for the Anglo-Russian convention are practically concluded.

One unimportant point remains to be settled. Minister Lamsdorff and Ambassador Harding met this afternoon to discuss how and where the signatures shall be exchanged.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 19.—General Stoessel has telegraphed to Emperor Nicholas that "Port Arthur can hold out several months."

London, Nov. 19.—The Daily Mail's St. Petersburg correspondent says Lieut. General Stoessel's report expresses a firm conviction that he will be able to hold out at Port Arthur until the second Pacific squadron arrives in March on the condition that he is supplied with munitions and stores. The government, the correspondent adds, has instructed its agents abroad to supply Lieut. General Stoessel's requirements at any cost.

Harbin, Nov. 19.—The report is circulated here that 3,000 Chinese bandits under Japanese officers, are moving toward the railway communications below Tie Pass.

Mukden, Nov. 19.—On the morning of Nov. 17, after a long silence, the distinct roar of cannon was heard, but where the fighting occurred is not yet known. There is no assurance yet that it means that a general fight is beginning. No excitement is yet displayed among Russian officers or Chinese here.

MILITARY COLLEGE.

Notice to Officers Contemplating Long Course of Instruction.

SALARY TOO SMALL.

And Chief Justice Lacoste of Quebec Will Resign His Job.

Montreal, Nov. 19.—It is an open secret here that within a few months Sir Alexander Lacoste, chief justice of the court of appeals, will retire from the highest court of the province, and resume his practice, which was considered worth from \$15,000 to \$20,000 a year. It is said that when Sir Alexander accepted the chief justiceship, it was on

condition that the stipend should be raised, but neither the late nor present government has been able to secure sufficient support from the country members to propose an increase for the city judges. The chief justice is now receiving \$6,000 annually.

BURNED TO DEATH.

Awful Fate that Overtook Two Nova Scotia Miners.

Calgary, N. W. T., Nov. 19.—Two brothers, Thomas and James Kennedy, hailing from Springhill, N. S., and just going to start work in the coal mines at Canmore, B. C., have been burned to death. They filled a lamp in their shack with what they thought was coal oil, and set the can on the stove, thinking that the fire was out. An explosion followed and both were instantly covered with flames. Thomas managed to get out, but died a few hours later, while James' charred body was taken out after the shack had turned.

QUEBEC ELECTIONS.

Thirty-Five Liberals and One Conservative Returned by Acclamation.

Montreal, Nov. 19.—Nominations for provincial elections took place yesterday. Thirty-five Liberals were elected by acclamation and one Conservative, Hon. P. E. LeBlanc, in Laval.

In eight other constituencies there is a straight party fight, and in fourteen others there is a fight on between Liberal candidates.

Of the remaining sixteen seats, in two the election will not be held until later, and in the other fourteen there is a medley of candidates, Liberals, Independents, Conservatives, Nationalists and labor men. In Lotbiniere there are five Liberals and a Conservative in the field, and in Quebec West four Liberals.

Altogether there are only thirteen Conservative candidates seeking election.

All the ministers with the exception of Hon. Dr. Guerin are returned by acclamation.

DAVIS OUT TOO.

Ontario Crown Land Commissioner Follows Stratton's Example.

TORONTO TORY ORGAN SAYS ONTARIO GENERAL ELECTIONS

Will be Held December 20.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Toronto, Nov. 19.—Hon. E. J. Davis, commissioner of crown lands in the Ross government, has resigned.

No reason is given.

The Mail and Empire says that Ontario elections will be held Dec. 20, nominations, Dec. 13th.

(Mr. Davis, who retires from the government, has represented North York, and is at present without a seat in the House, having been unseated a second time since the general election two years ago. He carries on an extensive tannery business, and has been talking for some time of leaving public life. He has been a member of the legislature continuously since 1888, entered the Hardy government without portfolio in 1896, became provincial secretary in the same year, and commissioner of crown lands, on the accession of Hon. Geo. W. Ross to the premiership.
