

FOURTEEN KILLED.

Death Dealing Explosion in a British Columbia Mine.

ONLY ONE MAN ESCAPED.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Fernie, B. C., Nov. 19.—Fourteen miners were killed in the Carbanado mines near Morrissey yesterday afternoon by a terrific explosion of coal gas.

The disaster occurred at No. 1 mine, ten miles west of Fernie. All the bodies were recovered.

The dead are: Mr. Jenkins, Lewis Carlin, Peter Kenney, Albert Sohnson, Patrick Boyle, William Platt, Mike Gustich, Anton Preyench, Venests Venenka, Martin Tomseakv, Anton and John Brandso, brothers, Joseph Suchy, James Greenman.

The wife of Jenkins arrived from England, Tuesday.

D. Darcy is the only man who escaped. He was a driver and was on his way out when the shock came. He heard the explosion in the interior, followed by a rush of dust and gas, and made his way to the tunnel mouth and was rescued, but is suffering severely from the shock.

Manager Simister and Sperrintendent Drinnan, were on the scene promptly and work of rescue proceeded.

A similar disaster occurred in the same colliery last year, when four men were killed.

A TRUE SPORTSMAN.

A Pennsylvania Man Who is Greatly Pleased With New Brunswick.

Mr. M. J. Poindexter of Reading, Pa., who has been sojourning in the city for the past few weeks, a guest at the Queen, is to leave for his home by this evening's train. Each secured a fine moose and Mrs. Poindexter shot a bear in addition. Mrs. Poindexter left for home shortly after her return to Fredericton, and Mr. Poindexter accompanied Mr. W. T. Chestnut to the Northwest Miramichi on a caribou hunt which turned out successful.

All the game trophies secured by Mr. and Mrs. Poindexter were turned over to Emack Bros. to be set up, and Mr. Poindexter decided to remain here until the work was finished. He has made a great many friends during his stay here and doesn't hesitate to say that he is greatly taken with New Brunswick and its people. He thinks this is the greatest country in the world for sport, and has made up his mind to become an annual visitor in future. It would not be surprising if he should decide to build a summer residence on one of the tributaries of the Miramichi and make it his headquarters.

THE DEATH ROLL.

Well Known Residents of the Parish of Douglas Called Away.

The death occurred at his home in Claudie Settlement, Parish of Douglas, on Friday, Nov. 18th after a lingering illness of Mr. William McCann, one of York county's most prosperous and highly respected farmers, in the 78th year of his age. Although not unexpected his death came as a severe blow to his family. The late Mr. McCann was much esteemed by all who knew him on account of his kind and generous disposition. He leaves a family of two sons and three daughters. The sons are Frank and William of Claudie, and the daughters are Mrs. Thomas Hayes of St. Mary's, Mrs. W. Hartney of North Sydney, N. S.; Mrs. C. Burns of Kingsley, and one step-daughter Miss Lizzie Jamieson at home. The latter was his constant attendant during his long illness. One twin sister Mrs. Michael McGinn, of this city also survives. The funeral will take place on Monday at ten o'clock from St. Anthony's church, St. Mary's, with interment at the

Hermitage. Robert B. Adams has charge of the funeral arrangements.

The death occurred at Kingsley yesterday of Mr. Thomas Foster a well known resident of that place. He was fifty-eight years of age, and is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Henry Anderson, Mrs. Alex. McFarlane and Mrs. Charles Anderson. The funeral will take place on Sunday at 10.30 o'clock, R. B. Adams, undertaker.
