Around the Market.

Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather there was a good sized market this morning, but in most lines of country produce, the price was hardly up to the standard. Phoenix Square was well filled up with teams, both sleds and wagons, some having travelled a considerable distance. Hay was rather scarce at \$12 per ton, potatoes brought 80 cents and \$1. chickens 40 to 60 cents, fowls 10 cents per pound, eggs 30 cents, butter 21 cents, pork 12 cents, lamb 6 and 7 cents, beef 4 and 5 cents, turnips 40 cents and carrots 50 cents.
