TO HONOR SENATOR WARK.

City Council Will Present Veteran Legislator

WITH CONGRATULATORY ADDRESS.

On the Celebration of His Approaching Centennial.

PEOPLES' LIGHT AND POWER CO. GRANTED CONCESSIONS.

In Return Will Light City Buildings Free of Charge.

Considerable business of an important nature was transacted by the city council at the regular monthly meeting last evening. Among other matters a resolution was adopted granting authority to the People's Light and Power Company to erect poles in the city on condition that they agree to light the city buildings free of charge for a period of years. A committee was appointed to prepare a congratulatory address to the venerable Senator Wark on his approaching centennial, and reports were received from chief engineer of the fire department and the superintendent of the water works. The old board of assessors were re-appointed for the ensuing year.

Those present at the meeting were Mayor Palmer in the chair and Aids, Farrell, Ross, Vanwart, Maxwell, Moore, Scott, Rodgers, Edwards and Stockford. The minutes of the last meeting were read by the city clerk and approved.

The auditors report for January was read by the mayor as follows:

The report was adopted and checks were ordered to be issued for the accounts making up the above totals.

On motion of Ald. Farrell, George Stewart, was ordered to be paid \$15, and Herbert Smith, \$12 on account of snow plowing contract.

Checks were ordered to be issued to the city officers for the monthly and quarterly salaries.

The alms house commissioner's report read by Ald. Vanwart, showed an expenditure for the month of \$209.64. The report was adopted and a check for \$250 was voted the commissioner for February.

The fire committee through the chairman, Ald. Ross, reported that contracts for supplying feed for the fire department horses had been awarded as follows: F. H. Everett, oats 45 cents per bushel, straw, 35 cents per hundred, bran, \$1.15 per hundred, and I. R. Golding, hay \$9.90 per ton. It was recommended that nine fire alarm tappers loaned by H. D. White to firemen living below Carleton street, be purchased for \$40. Adopted.

Ald. Farrell explained that a meeting of the assessment appeals committee, called by the city clerk, had failed to materialize consequently the committee had no report to submit.

The city clerk to whom was submitted a bill of \$19 from Daniel Ryan for sheep destroyed by dogs, reported that there was no liability on the city in such cases.

The Light Question.

The Mayor read the following communication from the People's Light and Power Company:

His Worship the Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Fredericton:

The petition of the undersigned The People's Light and Power Company of Fredericton, limited, humbly sheweth:

That the said The People's Light and Power Company of Fredericton, Limited, were incorporated under and by virtue of the New Brunswick Joint Stock Companies' Act, 1893, and amending acts and letters patent under the great seal of the province of New Brunswick were granted to the said company on the eighteenth day of February, 1903, for the purpose of supplying electric light and power within the City of Fredericton and county of York for commercial purposes, and to do all things incidental thereto and erect poles and string wires for such purposes within the said city of Fredericton, subject only to the consent of the common council of the City of Fredericton as to the erection of poles and stringing of wires, and otherwise entering upon the streets of the said city for the purposes aforesaid.

Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that such permission to erect poles and string wires and so forth according to the terms of the said charter, may be granted to them the said company, subject to the following condition and agreement, that is to say, that the said company upon the completion of the plant shall supply power for lighting the city of Fredericton's public buildings known as the city hall and the central fire hose station free of charge to the said city for the term of ten years from the date of the completion of said plant.

And as in duty bound will ever pray.

Ald. Vanwart said that the proposition seemed to him to be a reasonable one, and he had been most favorably impressed with it. He thought the council should comply with the request.

Ald. Vanwart moved, seconded by Ald. Moore, the following resolutions which were carried without division:

"Resolved, That the petition of the People's Light and Power Company, Ltd. of Fredericton, be received and the prayer thereof complied with; provided that the said Company shall execute an agreement with the city for the providing of such electric lighting as may be required for offices and opera house and council room in city hall; and also for both flats in central hose station; and also with a condition that in case of failure to provide such lighting to the satisfaction of the city council for the time being they shall, as rental for the franchise granted, pay to the city corporation such sum of money in lieu of the light as may enable the corporation to provide electric light for the said city hall, opera house and central hose station.

"And further provide that at the expiration of the ten years the franchise extends the same shall expire and if extension of the same be required it shall be on such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreed upon between the then city council and the said People's Light and Power Company or their assigns or successors;

"And further provided that before any of the poles are placed on any of the roads or highways of the city a plan showing the proposed location of the several poles shall be prepared and submitted to the city council for their approval, and after the same may be approved the said poles shall be erected and subject to the approval of the city road master or such other person as they may appoint for that purpose."

On motion of Ald. Moore, a lease of the lot on Queen street, lately held by the estate of the late Elijah Estabrooks, was granted to James A. Bell on the same terms.

A New Industry.

The Mayor read a communication from William Craydock of Woodstock, a king what concessions would be granted by the city for the establishment of a wood-working factory here, said factory to employ from 40 to 60 hands and have a capital of \$50,000.

The mayor stated that he had replied to the communication, stating that he would lay the matter before the council. He invited the applicants to visit the city and look over the ground for themselves and select a site.

A second letter from Mr. Craydock was received asking if the city would be willing to grant a bonus of \$10,000, and exemption from taxes and water rates for a term of years.

Ald. Farrell was inclined to the opinion that too much was asked from the city. He would like to have a more definite proposition before action was taken by the council. He moved that the city clerk be instructed to reply to the communication and request that the proposition be put in writing. This motion was adopted.

The mayor read a letter from Mr. Cook president of the Canadian Municipalities Association, setting forth the objects of the organization and asking that the city contribute the sum of \$28 to the funds. It was stated that this amount would be sufficient, providing other municipalities contribute their share. In return the organization promises to watch all legislation affecting municipalities and endeavor to guard their interest.

The mayor explained that all that was wanted at the present time was an expression of opinion from the council.

On motion of Ald. Vanwart it was decided to forward a favorable reply to the request.

The report of the chief engineer of the fire department was adopted and ordered to be published in the annual accounts. It will be found in another part of this issue.

of wood, was read by the city clerk, and the resignation was accepted.

The city clerk said that Mr. Joshua Chappell had made application to him for the position.

The Opera House.

Ald. Scott said that at a recent meeting of the city hall committee, Mr. W. T. H. Fenety had made a proposal to lease the opera house for one year. The committee had promised to deal with the matter, but on account of the absence of Ald. Clark, no meeting had been held. Mr. Fenety had shown from the reports that the average receipts of the opera house since 1891 were only \$639. Mr. Fenety offered to pay \$600 per year rental. The committee had received another offer of \$1000 per year for the opera house, and Ald. Scott thought that if the hall was to be leased it might be put up to tender. He had no motion to make in regard to the matter, but would like an expression of opinion.

Deplorable State of Affairs in Alaska.

Washington, Feb. 2.—The House went into committee of the whole and resumed consideration of the urgent deficiency bill.

When the paragraph providing for the destitute Indians of Alaska was reached, Mr. Cowherd (Mo.) said the condition of the natives of Alaska is deplorable. Game laws have been passed, he said, even to protect the ferocious bear, while the native is left to die of starvation. The Alaskan Indian was the only Indian that has never raised a hand against the white man. Legislation should be enacted to preserve the Indian, instead of the game, he added.

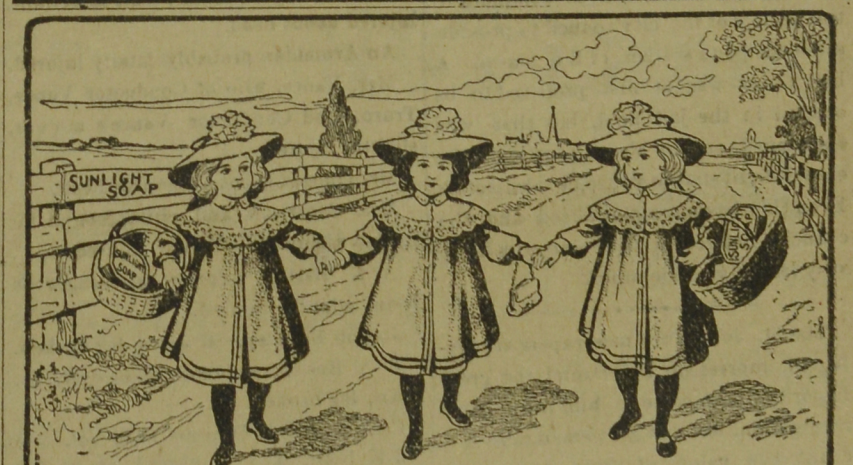
