

GREAT LECTURE.

Rev. Mark Guy Pearse
Held Audience
Spellbound

AS HE DEPICTED LIFE IN LONDON.

And the Urgent Need of
Practical Religious
Efforts.

Rev. Mark Guy Pearse of London, delivered his celebrated lecture on Christian Socialism in the Methodist church last evening in the presence of a large audience. Dr. J. R. Inch, chief superintendent of education, occupied the chair and in introducing the speaker of the evening, paid a tribute to his ability as a lecturer and expounder of the Gospel.

Rev. Mr. Pearse spoke for an hour and a half, and was listened to with the most profound interest. He dealt with his subject in a masterly manner, and treated the audience to a number of bright anecdotes from his own experience which provoked roars of laughter. The rev. gentleman is a very dramatic and witty speaker, one of the kind that an audience would never get tired listening to.

At the outset the lecturer returned thanks for the opportunity afforded him of delivering an address and spoke in glowing terms of the great kindness extended to him on all sides during his sojourn in Canada. He dwelt at some length on the magnitude of the City of London; a city with a population of 6,500,000 souls, more than all the other European cities, more than Canada, more than Australia and more than South Africa. Imagine Fredericton extended for a distance of 150 miles and you will have some idea of the vastness of the World's Metropolis. Imagine in that great city nearly a million people living, not one family in a house, but one family and in many cases three families in a single room. He was afraid that in all great cities the conditions were becoming similar to those in London. Our cities are built upon a volcano and sooner or later it has got to burst. He did not think it was enough to send people to Heaven when they died, but thought that there should be a gospel that would be of some benefit to them on earth. When these great volcanoes burst he believed that the lava would pour down upon our own cities and towns. The time had arrived when the people should wake up and look these matters squarely in the face. There are in London one million of people living in a condition which the law considers as insanitary. No less than six hundred thousand of the people live in one room houses. Imagine boys and girls growing up under such deplorable conditions. What decency can one possibly have where there is no morality.

The speaker then told of the experiences his own son had had in doing missionary work in the slums of London. He had gone right among the toughest element of the community and practised the religion he preached. He had taken four hundred hoodlums, who had never seen anything but a streak of smoky sky, out into the country where they could breathe God's pure air. After humorously describing the impressions made upon these people by their first glimpse of the country, the speaker declared in emphatic language that the man who does his fair share towards the welfare of the nation in which he lives has earned his fair share of the pleasures of life. (Applause.) He had felt as he passed through Canada that England was the paradise of the rich and the purgatory of the poor, while Canada was the paradise of the middle classes. He had never seen a country in his life where prosperity was so widespread as in Canada. (Applause.) It is not a question of drink with the working classes in England, but

work and slave as they might; they cannot keep from going to the workhouse. Drink often drives men to the slums, and the slums often drive men to drink. Think what life would be to all of us if after working and slaving all our lives we should have nothing ahead but the prospect of the workhouse. He didn't believe that the grace of God was intended to make man content with conditions such as that. On the contrary it was more liable to make his soul rebel against such conditions. It was not much wonder to him that the working man in the large cities did not go to church. There is the public house, light, warm and attractive, while the church is shut up six days in the week. If they want to get the laboring men into the church they will have to make it more attractive. You can never overcome the drink traffic by holding temperance meetings, but you must make the church as attractive as the public house. On one occasion he had offered eighty pounds a year to have a certain church in London opened, and heated on week days for the use of the poor people in the neighborhood, but was told by the trustees that they did not want the riff raff. No church can be made as sacred as the men, women and children who walk this earth of ours. Humanity will never deprecate a church, but on the contrary consecrate it to God. It was Moody who said that the biggest waste on earth today is your churches shut up from day to day and never doing anything for humanity. He held that the remedy for anarchism and socialism was not in denouncing them but by sweeping away the evils that bring about such conditions. He had retired from mission work when sixty years of age, because he wanted to give the young men a chance. Some college students when they learned that one of their number was spending his evenings with his best girl wired him on one occasion as follows: "Dear Smith, are you holding your own?" He wired back, "no, the old folks are still here." (Laughter.) Get out of the way you old folks and give the young folks a chance. Make way for the enthusiasm of youth. He had heard people say that socialism was un-Christianlike. In reply to that he would say that it was not the un-Christian socialist that gave the most trouble, but the un-Christian Christian. The great revival that is coming will not concern itself so much about saving people when they die as it will to save them from the hells of this earth. He was almost afraid of the selfishness of religion in this great country of Canada. He did not like big words and if he had his way he would pass a law consigning every word that a boy or girl couldn't understand to the worn out ministers fund. He believed that out of religion it is possible to make the oiliest and most sanctimonious selfishness that he knew of. He who did not do his duty as a citizen would not do his duty as a Christian. He believed that political conditions in the United States would be in a better condition if the Christian people did their duty as citizens. Religion should begin with individual salvation, and the only way to keep religion is to give it away with a life of love. The question God will ask is not how do you feel, but how did you make other people feel. The ugliest thing that ever came into God's world is the religion that doesn't make men like the Lord Jesus Christ. There is nothing that stinks in the nostrils of men like

He wanted to inspire the people with hope and send them away so that they will walk with a firmer step and have a bluer sky over their head. Oh why are we ready to give the devil such heaps of credit over the Lord Jesus Christ. In every man there is more good than bad. "Where sin abounded, grace did much more abound."

The lecturer then at some length spoke of the work in which he and others are engaged in London and related in his own characteristic way a number of amusing and striking anecdotes gathered from his own experience which kept the audience in the best of humor. On one occasion when asked if he thought checkers were right as a form of amusement he had replied "There are only ten commandments, don't you make twenty of them." He believed that the churches should be made as attractive, bright and warm as the saloons, but without the drink. He did not care half as much about going to heaven when he died as he did about making it better for people on earth while he lived.

In closing his eloquent address Rev. Mr. Pearse appealed to the audience to contribute to his children's fresh air fund.

The chairman complimented Rev. Mr. Pearse on his address, which he said contained many lessons they needed to learn and was the Gospel according to Mark.

A hearty vote of thanks, moved by Rev. James Crip and seconded by Rev. Mr. Hartman, was presented to the lecturer, and the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

Therefore advertisements offering situations at the Fair are unlikely to be genuine. The devices to mislead are numerous and we can only urge young women to beware of all advertisements and to thoroughly investigate them as we fear that through them many young girls are being deceived to their own ruin.

Young Woman Leaped Fully Dressed Into River.

New York, June 20.—The Herald today says: Startled by the cry that a person had accidentally fallen overboard from Canarsie pier in front of the Sunset hotel last evening, a well dressed young woman, pushing her way through the excited throng of men and woman, leaped to the rescue, without waiting to remove her clothing. She was Mrs. Kathryn Van Houten, aged twenty-seven, of No. 90 Stone avenue.

The young woman swam to where a derby hat could be seen floating. Several men manned rowboats and quickly followed her, but the young woman displayed her ability as a powerful swimmer, leading them by several yards. She dived several times near the spot where the hat floated, but failed to find any one.

Just then it was announced that the report of a man being overboard was a mistake, that the hat had simply blown from the head of a fisherman, who had come in on a sloop which was being moored at the pier. Declining the aid of a boatman, Mrs. Van Houten swam back to the pier. She was pretty well exhausted when she reached a nearby float. As she was being dragged from the water, Mrs. Van Houten suddenly screamed, as her leg struck the point of a sharp nail at the end of the float. Ambulance Surgeon Dooley of the Bradford Street Hospital dressed the woman's injury and she was removed to her home.

WILL CONTESTED.

Brothers and Sister of Late Mr. Gagnon Claims His Estate.

Edmundston, N. B., June 20.—The will of the late Narcisse Gagnon, M. P. P., for Madawaska County, is to be contested. He died some months ago and his will, dated November 1903, leaves his estate valued at some \$60,000 to Regis A. Cyr as sole legatee and whom also he appointed his executor. He is named in the will as grand nephew of deceased and the claim is put forward that he did not bear that relation to Mr. Gagnon but was grand nephew of his wife.

The matter of the will will come up before Thomas Lawson, J. P., pro hac vice tomorrow. Messrs. Stevens and Lawson are counsel with Pius Michaud for the executor, and legatee and Fred Laforest of this place, and Daniel Muir, K. C., of St. John, will appear for the next of kin—two brothers of deceased who

are resident in Montreal and also a sister, Mrs. Henrietta Bellavance, of Montreal.

The case is awaited with considerable interest here.

CHILD SANG AS SHE DIED.

Ten-Year-Old Girl Met Death with Hymn on Her Lips.

Philadelphia, June 20.—Father, mother and daughter, all badly burned, were rushed four miles and a half last night in the patrol wagon of the Thirty-second District to the University Hospital. The little girl, Mary McKissick, ten years old, died at 2 o'clock next morning, after terrible suffering. The mother's condition is still serious. Frank McKissick sat by his child's bedside, unmindful of his own pain, until she died.

Just before the end came the child seemed to realize that death was near at hand.

"I'm going to sing," she said, and, in perfect tune, she began, "Nearer My God to Thee." Before she had finished the hymn her breath failed her and she sank back on the pillow dead.

The family lives in Darby. The child's dress caught fire from an exploding lamp. The mother caught her in her arms and her own clothing caught fire. The father then carried them both to Darby Creek and immersed them in it, putting out the flames.
