The Market.

There was a fairly large number of country people in the market this morning but there was not much of a variety of articles exposed for sale. Butter was the most plentiful commodity and brought from 16 cts. to 18 cts. per lb. Eggs remained firm at 18 cts. and 19 cts. Veal was the only kind of meat offered for sale and the price ranged from 5 cts. to 7 cts. Rhabarb sold at 2 cts. per pound. Potatoes were offered for sale at \$1.50 per bbl. There was no hay in today but the price asked yesterday was \$8.00 and \$9.00 per ton.

Frederictonian Abroad.

The Toronto News publishes a double column portrait and appreciative sketch of Mr. Wm. H. Tippet, a former Fredericton man, who has just been elected president of St. George's Society of Toronto. The News says: "Mr. Tippet came to Toronto in 1892 as representative of the firm of Arthur P. Tippet & Co., of Montreal. He is a Canadian, and was born at Bear Island, Parish of Queensbury, York County, New Brunswick, and is the fourth son of the late Rev. Hy. Wm. Tippet, who came to Canada in 1842, and who was rector of that parish and died in 1874. Mr. Tippet is a member of the Anglican Church, and was warden of the Church of the Holy Trinity for several years, a position that he filled to the satisfaction of both the rector and the congregation."

Death at Marysville.

Mrs. Martha McDonald widow of the late Murray McDonald died at her home at Marysville at two o'clock this morning after one week's illness from pneumonia. The deceased was 46 years of age, is survived by two sons. She was formerly a Miss Hill of Nashwaak and is survived by a mother and six brothers who reside at that place. The funeral will take place at two o'clock on Monday afternoon. Rev. Messrs. Cowie and Robinson of Gibson will conduct the services at the house and the remains will be taken to Nashwaak where interment will be made at the Church of England burying ground. R. B. Adams will have charge of the arrangements.

Cotton Mill Fire.

Fire broke out in the picking room of the Marysville cotton factory yesterday, and for a time matters looked quite serious. The fire was caused by friction of the belting with an iron shaft. A number of the workmen got to work and with the aid of automatic sprinklers, a number of which are kept in the factory, and succeeded in a time in having the fire under control. Considerable damage, however was done to one of the picking machines and wood work, and the water also caused much damage to the stock in the room.
