OUR NATIONAL ANNIVERSARY.

Canada, as a Confederation, will celebrate tomorrow the thirty-seventh anniversary of its birth, and every loyal son of the country feels pride and satisfaction at the splendid advance that has been made since that day, July 1st, 1867, when the welding of the four original provinces of the Dominion into one common bond was proclaimed.

Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia formed the most populous of Britain's possessions in North America, but in area they were small indeed in comparison to the territory that has since been added to the Dominion, whose extent, and progress is well indicated in some facts presented in another part of this paper.

The confederation was launched 37 years ago under considerable difficulty, and surrounded by a great deal of bitterness. The anti-confederate party in some of the provinces, notably in Nova Scotia, prophesied dire calamity for the country, but their prognostications came to naught. The fathers of confederation knew whereof they were building, they built well, and any man who would now proclaim that confederation was a mistake would be laughed to scorn.

What strides Canada has made since 1867. We have developed not only a great country, but a great nationality, and one of the most pleasing features of the present day is the splendid national sentiment that prevails among the people of Canada, who are proud to call themselves Canadians. This spirit is everywhere fostered and its growth has been marvellous.

A great destiny awaits Canada and its wonderful progress excites the admiration of the world. Settlers are rushing to our borders from almost every land. Our resources are being developed under wise and beneficent government, and we are hopeful, yea certain, that before the close of the present century Canada will be almost equal in importance to her powerful neighbour in the south.

Canadians one and all will celebrate tomorrow's anniversary with pride at the great things Providence provided, advance all along the line, unexampled prosperity, civil and religious freedom, and all the blessings that go to make a country great and glorious.

COL. HUGHES' QUERY.

Col. Hughes is asking in Parliament whether or not Col. White, D. O. C. of New Brunswick recommended Col. Jones of St. John as brigadier for Camp Sussex, and if so, was his recommendation set aside and Col. McLean substituted. We cannot anticipate the government's answer to Col. Hughes' query, but if it turns out that Col. Jones was recommended by Col. White, the circumstance would indicate something of a family compact in the New Brunswick militia, for Col. Jones happens to be Col. White's son-in-law, but possibly if the D. O. C. recommended his relative, he never thought of the relationship. Anyhow if Col. Jones was not appointed but Col. McLean given the place, it made a fairer division of the staff officers among the two political parties. Col. Vince and Capt. Arm-

strong of the staff are both Conservatives.

It is to be hoped that Col. White did not recommend his own son-in-law for the staff, for such an act would be open to criticism, although Col. Jones for aught we know may be a very competent officer. It is better in these things to avoid even the appearance of favoritism.

Dr. Pickell, of Sweetsburg, Que., who, although without any military qualifications, was appointed to command a squadron of cavalry but was properly turned down by Hon. Mr. Fisher, is in camp with the corps at La Prairie, with the rank of sergeant. It would have done him no harm to have started as a private. The Tory effort to make him a major was one of the most absurd things that ever happened in connection with the Canadian militia, and it was that foolish proceeding that led up to the Dundonald incident.

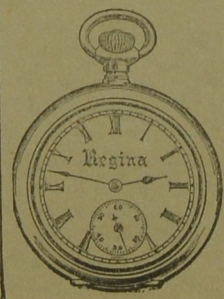

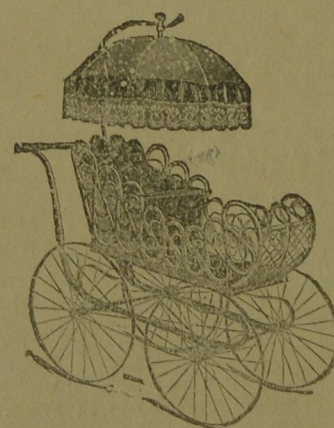
