THE ALLEGED PICKPOCKETS.

Photographs of Them will be Sent to the Boston Police.

The three alleged pickpockets, Grant, Williams and Howard, now in jail here, were taken to Burkhardt's studio yesterday afternoon and photographed, having previously given their consent to the operation. Two pictures were taken of each, standing and sitting, and they were photographed separately.

Col. Marsh has instructed the photographer to give out only two copies of each picture. One set will go to the C. P. R. authorities and the other to the Boston chief of police.

While the evidence against the prisoners is not very conclusive, it seems to be the general impression that the police magistrate will send the case to a higher court, and in the meantime the records of the prisoners will be looked into. They can rest assured that they will receive a fair trial, and will be given the benefit of the doubt as to their guilt. If they are innocent of the crime charged against them they have not very much to fear.

The opinion seems to be getting stronger in the minds of the authorities that the fellow Sullivan, who came here from Boston on Monday, in response to a telegram sent by one of the prisoners, was not quite all he represented himself to be. It will be remembered that he produced what purported to be a certificate of membership to the bar of the State of California, and the police magistrate accepted the document as genuine. Mr. Taylor, the prosecuting attorney, had his suspicions of the fellow, however, and took the trouble to wire to California and enquire if such a man as Cornelius Sullivan was a practising barrister of that state. A reply came promptly informing him that no such name was on the roll. Had this intelligence come to hand a little sooner it is probable that the stranger would have been landed in jail as an accomplice of the trio.

Mr. H. F. McLeod, the counsel for the defence, when asked what he thought of his associate counsel, remarked that he was a little worse than no good. It is said that Mr. McLeod advised the prisoners to get rid of him as quickly as possible.

Mrs. Williams, the wife of one of the prisoners, is stopping at the York Hotel, and is kept pretty busy carrying eatables to the jail.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING.

The monthly meeting of the school board was held yesterday afternoon with Dr. Atherton in the chair, and all the members present except Mr. Kitchen, who is out of town. A lot of routine business incidental to the close of the term was transacted, and some consideration was given to the subject matter of the annual report to go to the chief superintendent.

A letter was read from the St. John exhibition association announcing that prizes would be awarded at the exhibition for the best essays on any wild plant that encroached upon cultivated crops. It was explained by the secretary that the information had been imparted to the pupils previous to the school closing last week.

Miss Ella Thorne, of the High school staff, who has been connected with the city schools for the long period of thirty years, applied for and was granted leave of absence for next term, to permit of her making an extended trip abroad.

The usual committees were appointed to look after the work of repairing the school buildings during the coming summer.

It was decided to hold another meeting on July 9th to deal with the question of grading.

THE INSTITUTE.

The third session of the Teachers' Institute opened at St. John, yesterday at ten o'clock with Dr. J. R. Inch presiding. The hall was well filled, quite a number of visitors being present, as well as a large attendance of teachers.

E. E. MacCreedy was the first speaker and had as his subject Manual Training. He told of the establishment of the first New Brunswick manual training school at Fredericton four years ago and of the number of schools that had been established since that time. This branch of education has given the greatest satisfaction wherever it has been tried, and several new schools will be established in September. He pointed out that Canada stands in need of more technical education, so that its great resources may be developed, and expressed the hope that the New Brunswick school system would soon embrace an excellent course of manual training.

At the conclusion of Mr. MacCreedy's address Dr. Inch referred to the faithfulness with which Mr. MacCreedy had labored and the regret which his departure to the United States would cause.

D. W. Hamilton, M. A., next spoke on Consolidated Schools. He pictured a country school house in New Brunswick. All the imperfections of the building and of its equipment, as well as its over-crowding were touched upon in a graphic manner. Mr. Hamilton then showed that in many cases the course of study in country schools provided little that was of much material benefit to the boys and girls whose lives would be spent on farms. A consolidated school building with its well-kept and attractive grounds, its modern and useful equipment, its abundance of room and its apartments for Domestic Science Manual Training, Nature Study, etc., was then pictured in contrast to the country school house before mentioned.

Miss E. P. Flagg, formerly of the Mount Allison Ladies' College, was the next speaker, having as her subject the Aim and Purpose of Household Economy. Miss Flagg said that the aim of this study was to train every girl so that she may be adequately fitted to fill her place in life. Girls must be trained to be home makers, for the life of the home determines what the life of the nation shall be. Miss Flagg contended that faulty ventilation, poor cooking and other home troubles are responsible for much crime and poverty.

Miss Watson, director of the McDonald Institute at Guelph, Ont., next addressed the meeting, giving a description of her work at Guelph, where the course was shown to include non-professional and professional courses. The first of these is designed to educate girls in home problems, while the second is for those who wish to become teachers of Household Economy.

At the afternoon session Inspector Bridges moved a resolution of regret at Mr. E. E. MacCreedy's departure, and it passed unanimously, and the balance of the session was taken up by Mr. Keyes, who spoke on the Life and Growth of the teacher.

Last evening the Teachers' Institute devoted itself to the lighter side of life and an enjoyable social was held. The reception committee consisted of Dr. and Mrs. Bridges, Inspector and Mrs. Carter, Mr. and Mrs. Owens, Miss Bartlett and W. J. S. Myles.
