BIG GAME PLENTIFUL.

Guide Cremin Back from an Extended Trip to the Nepisiquit.

Charles Cremin, the well known guide of Scotch Lake who has been on an extended trapping expedition to camps on the headwaters of the Nepisiquit and Upsalquitch Rivers since early in May, returned home on Tuesday evening. He trapped seven bears, all good sized ones, and brought the pelts with him to this city. Mr. Cremin says that big game wintered well in the section visited by him, and he saw a great many moose during his trip. In one day he counted eleven at one of the Bathurst Lakes, five of the number being big bulls. Mr. Cremin left his home camp at Bathurst Lake at seven o'clock Monday and the next morning caught the train at Plaster Rock which connected him with the C. P. R. train for this city. He had to travel fifty-two miles in a canoe and drive twenty-eight before reaching Plaster Rock, which is considered a pretty good achievement for one day.
