Thursday evening in the Senate at Ottawa Senator Dandurand set on foot the liveliest "scene" which the august assembly has experienced for many moons. He moved the "previous question." This brought a dozen Senators to their feet at once, with several starting to speak simultaneously, Senator McMullen was one of these. Senator J. K. Kerr asked whether he was talking to the main question or to the previous question. Senator McMullen arose and pounded his desk, protesting against the interruption. Senator Kerr called on him to apologize.

"I will not apologize for anything," Mr. McMullen replied.

"No, you don't know enough to apologize," was the rejoinder.

Senator McMullen was annoyed that anyone should use such language to him.

Senator Kerr moved that the words be taken down, but the appeal passed unnoticed in the efforts of Senators Landry, Orlan, Domville, McMullen and others to be heard at the same time. Senator Orlan expressed his indignation at the application of "the gag" in a free assembly.

Hon. R. W. Scott said:—"It is most unseemly that a young member of this House should be continually lecturing Senators, some of whom were here before he was born. The hon. gentleman has found his level in this House now."

Then followed a scene of intense excitement. Senator Orlan remained on his feet while other members cried out, "Sit down, sit down, you have no right to stand up."

There was a difference of 51 seconds in favor of the White Bear at the start and the sum total of the result achieved shows that the challenger added two seconds to this during the race.

Few Seawaka cup races have been sailed under Saturday's conditions. The wind was estimated at twenty knots. A

heavy roll accompanied it and tested the seamanship of the crews.

White Bear did a remarkable bit of sailing, making the close reach on the second leg of the first round. The distance of one and a third miles was covered in six minutes and four seconds, which meant that the yacht sailed at the rate of 13 15 knots an hour.

The lead obtained at the start by the challenger was never made up by the Canadian. Both yachts showed good weather qualities. Noona showed to best advantage in windward work.
