

PORT ARTHUR

Russian General Reports Assaults on the Fortress Futile, AND WERE REPULSED WITH SMALL LOSS TO THE DEFENDERS.

Russians Fortifying Tie Pass.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Sept. 14.—General Kuropatkin estimates the Russian losses from August 28 to Sept. 5 at 4,000 killed and 12,000 wounded.

Tokio, Sept. 14.—Field Marshal Oyama confirms reports that a considerable force of Russians remain south of Hun River and says that the Russians are fortifying heights on both sides of Liao Yang River at Tie Pass.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 14.—Gen. Stossels, commander of the Russian military forces at Port Arthur, under date of August 28 and Sept. 2, reports that the main Japanese attacks on the fortress were repulsed with small loss to the defenders.

Oyster Bay, Sept. 14.—Russia's auxiliary cruiser Lena, which put into the port of San Francisco last Sunday, presumably from Vladivostok, either will have to leave that port within a short time prescribed by this government or will have to dismantle. That is the decision of the American government.

London, Sept. 14.—Bennett Burleigh cabling from Tien Tsin to the Daily Telegraph, insists that the Japanese casualties in the battle of Liao Yang were nearer 30,000 than 17,000.

WANTS HEAVY DAMAGES.

Senator McLaren's Timber Limits Ruined by Forest Fires.

Winnipeg, Sept. 14.—It is reported at McLeod that Senator McLaren has entered a suit against the C. P. R. for \$125,000 damages caused by forest fires of the past few months.

The Senator's extensive lumber limits of Crow's Nest are practically ruined and it is alleged that the fires were started by sparks from C. P. R. locomotives.
