

CANADIAN WHEAT

Imported Into the United States for Manufacture.

CONSIGNMENT TO DETROIT MILLING COMPANY PAID DUTY OF \$10,000.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Detroit, Dec. 5.—Canada is already supplying the United States with wheat.

Steamer, W. H. Mack, arrived Sunday with 200,000 bushels of Manitoba wheat, of which 40,000 bushels were landed here for the Commercial Milling Company.

The American duty on Canadian wheat is twenty-five cents per bushel, and the Detroit concern paid \$10,000 duty on the consignment.

This is the first large shipment brought here.

THE BICYCLE RACE.

One of the Contestants Hurt and May Retire.

New York, Dec. 5.—In the great six day bicycle race at 8 a. m. today, sixteen teams were tie at 176 miles, after hard riding all night.

One team is out altogether, the pace was too hot.

So far no new records have been equalled.

REMARKABLE MEETING.

Russians at St. Petersburg Demand Constitutional Rights, etc.

London, Dec. 5.—A despatch from St. Petersburg to a news agency says that a remarkable meeting, composed of the cream of the Russian intelligent classes, was held Sunday night.

Numerous resolutions were adopted, demanding constitutional reforms, free speech, parliament, etc.

A poem was read denouncing carrying on the unjust war in Manchuria. The meeting closed at 3 a. m., with shouts of "Down with autocracy."

IT WAS HOT WORK.

Men Were Mercilessly Hewn down in the Struggle for Metre Hill.

Tokio, Dec. 5.—The diary of the fighting around 203 Metre Hill, which is published in the Japanese papers, describes the terrible losses involved in the storming of the Russian position from dawn of Nov. 28th until 11 o'clock of the forenoon of that day. A Russian counter attack began at dawn on Nov. 29th and was so furiously pushed that the Japanese leaders were compelled to retire from both sides of the hill into the valley. The attack was renewed the morning of Nov. 30th "when all the Japanese reserves came up" from the southwestern corner, but these assailants only advanced thirty metres by five o'clock, so stubborn was the resistance, and the Japanese suffered severe losses. Then, being reinforced, the Japanese maintained the struggle with terrible earnestness. Furious charges were repeatedly made, and the Russians were compelled gradually to retire. The south western summit of the hill was not occupied until seven o'clock in the evening and the northwest summit not until 8 o'clock. During the night six Russian counter attacks were repulsed. One, which was launched at 4 o'clock in the morning, was characterized by several bayonet attacks and was persisted in until noon of December 1, when the hopelessness of the attempts becoming evident, the Russians retired.

London, Dec. 5.—The Morning Post's correspondent at Shanghai telegraphs as follows:

"Russia practically is converting Shanghai into a depot for her military and naval stores. A local German butcher has received a Russian order for several million pounds of meat. Large quantities of coal are held here on Russian account. The infringement of Shanghai's neutrality is arousing great indignation."
