

MONTAGUE IN BOSTON.

Speech at Banquet of Home Market Club.

Canada Pictured as Holding Fort by Protection and Imperial Connection.

Boston, Dec. 2.—The banquet of the Home Market Club, which took place in Boston last night, was one of the greatest banquets which have ever taken place in this city. Over eleven hundred people prominent in business and political life from all over New England were present, there being Senators, Congressmen, governors and Lieut.-governors from a number of States. The guests' table was filled with leading statesmen, including Vice-President-elect Fairbanks, Secretary of the Navy Long, and Governor Bates of Massachusetts. The audience rose en masse and sang "The Maple Leaf Forever."

Hon. Dr. Montague, ex-M. P. of Canada, spoke for an hour and a half, being constantly applauded, and when he concluded his speech the audience rose again and gave three rousing cheers and called and insisted on him again rising and bowing his thanks. He spoke of Canadian progress and institutions, and dealt fully with the history of tariff matters in the Dominion. He said that Canada stood for Canadian industry, and would not give up her industry for any reciprocal arrangements. He declared that Canada was British to the core, and that she would never desert the empire. In a splendid oration he pictured the United States and Great Britain policing the world, and thus assuring to the nations for all time political and religious liberty.

Mr. Long said of Canada:—"So broad in her domain, so spirited in her industrial and every other growth, so swiftly springing to her opportunities, potentially so close and powerful a friend—whether she remain a mighty part of mighty Imperial Great Britain, whether she stand alone or whether she join her fortunes with ours, her great advance is sure, and we give her the glad hand across the border; that after all is only little more than an imaginary line. We already have with her the reciprocity of good-will or mutual respect and of mutual consciousness of our common obligations for the welfare of the continent of which we two are so large a part. And whenever and wherever by more liberal trade relations and by mutual give-and-take tariff concessions, which shall not impair the general industrial and commercial interests of either side, these general interests can be conserved and promoted, we are for reciprocity in that respect also."

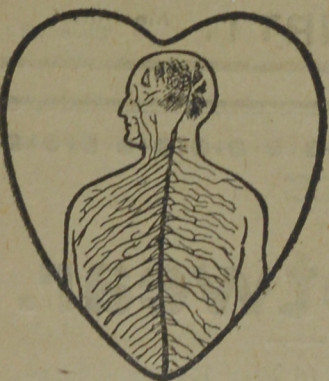

The committee decided to purchase a piece of property in Winnipeg, and to erect thereon a mission church for the Galicians.

The Epworth Leagues memorialized the committee to employ the money belonging to them, now in the hands of the General Board, for educational work in foreign missions, in China especially. After a long discussion upon the urgency of such work, it was decided to appoint a sub-committee of five brethren to confer with the secretaries and treasurers of the Board, and to report as to details at a later session. Dr. Carman presided at the meeting.

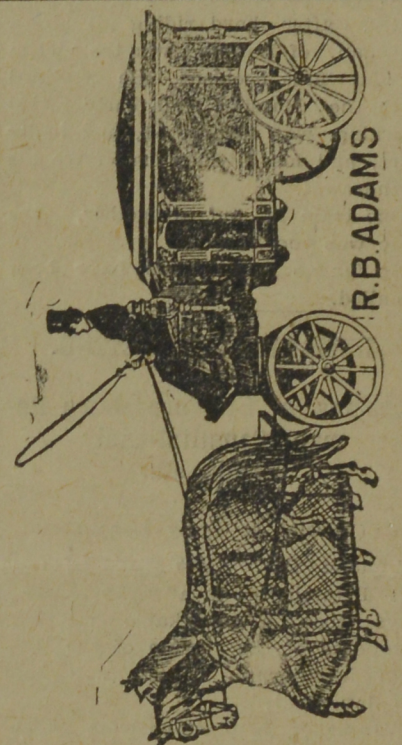
