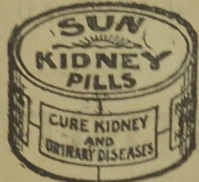

SAY WOMAN BOUGHT VOTES.

Other Denver Women Assert They Received \$5 Apiece.

Denver, Dec. 3.—Another woman Mrs. Rosa Snyder, was arrested today on warrant charging her with buying votes at the late election. Lizzie Cummings and other women have made affidavits that Mrs. Snyder gave them \$5 each to vote the Republican ticket. Mrs. Snyder is a complainant in one of the cases against Democrats arrested on warrants charging conspiracy to intimidate voters.

The cases came up in Commissioner Capron's court today, but the hearings were postponed, although George Alton Smith, attorney for the defendant, demanded an immediate trial.

Governor elect Alva Adams came to Denver from his home in Pueblo today, and will remain until after the banquet to be given in his honor tomorrow night. He does not take the threat of the Republicans to prevent his accession to the governorship seriously, and has rented a house for the two years of his term.

TERRIBLE EXPERIENCES.

Two Survivors Out of a Crew of Nine.

London, Dec. 3.—A story of terrible experiences is told by the two survivors of the crew of nine of the steamer *Blanch* which was sunk in the Mersey River in a collision Wednesday night. They escaped in a lifeboat, which immediately dashed against the sinking steamer, three of the seamen being drowned.

The remaining six righted the boat and rowed away, but were buffeted by the waves, which soon filled the boat with freezing water. Two more died of exposure.

Again the boat was capsized, but the four survivors by superhuman efforts managed to scramble in again. Though almost dead from cold, they renewed their efforts to reach shore, but two more succumbed. At 3 o'clock Thursday morning the lifeboat struck shore at Formby, and the two survivors painfully dragged the boat and its gruesome cargo through the surf to land.

NAVAL MILITIA BILL.

Mr. Prefontaine's Proposal for Canadian Navy.

Ottawa, Dec. 3.—As announced some time ago, Hon. Raymond Prefontaine's naval militia scheme provides for the acquisition of three training vessels from the British Government. One of the vessels will be located in the Maritime Provinces, the second on the Upper Lakes and the third in British Columbia waters. There will be eight instructors in each vessel, obtained presumably from the British Royal navy. The militia will be trained for three seasons and then go into to reserve. At the end of about eight years it is expected to have a reserve of 10,000 trained men. The permanent navy militia will number 800, of whom 300 will be on the Atlantic coast, 200 on the lakes, and 300 on the British Columbia coast.

Princeton Freshman Expelled.

Princeton, N. J., Dec. 2.—Princeton's "honor system" was given another test in the recent examinations of the freshman class, with the result that one entering student was dismissed from college today. The freshman, whose name the faculty withheld, attempted to get outside assistance on his examinations, and one of his classmates who was nearby immediately reported the matter to the student tribunal, which recommended expulsion. Last year six students were apprehended by this method and expelled.

* LIVED IN FIVE REIGNS.

Parish Clerk's Memories of the Battle of Waterloo.

Mr. James Carne, the veteran vergier and parish clerk of St. Columb Minor, in Cornwall, related recently to a Daily Chronicle representative a few incidents of an interesting life that covers a period of nearly 100 years. Mr. Carne has lived in the reigns of five sovereigns. He was born soon after Trafalgar was won, and was nine years old when Waterloo was fought. He admits that he cannot grumble at the length of his days and the excellence of his health. The connection of Mr. Carne's family with St. Columb Minor covers a period of about 160 years. His grandfather served as vergier and parish clerk for nearly 50 years; his father held office for 54 years; and Mr. Carne has performed the duties for nearly 60 years.

Most of his life has been spent in the quiet village two miles from the now popular health resort of Newquay, and during his long term of office he has missed attending service at the church only once, and that was when his wife died. Events of the days of the Georges are almost as fresh in the old man's memory as those of the present century. He recalls the time of the late Queen Victoria's birth, and her accession and coronation. Talking with him, or seeing him walk as firmly as a man of 40, it is difficult to believe that he has lived for nearly a century. A little deafness, scarcely noticeable, is almost his only affliction. The old gentleman delights in recalling incidents of West Country wrestling and other manly sports that were the delight of the countryside in the days of his youth, and speaks of one particular match with all the enthusiasm of a boy. Regarding Waterloo, although he has a lively recollection of the time, he cannot remember how and by what means the news reached his quiet village.

Speaking of the development of Newquay, he remembered the time when there were only about twenty houses there, two or three of which belonged to his father. These, unfortunately, were sold before the building boom set in. If they had been retained by his family, "they would have been worth some money now," he remarked. As a special favor to the interviewer Mr. Carne sang a verse of a song for singing which a man "nearly got locked up" when he was a youth. As his interviewer was leaving him the veteran remarked, "I'm the best man in the county"—with the reservation—"at my age."

Shakespeare's Bible.

A deep interest will attach to the sale, at Sotheby's, of "Shakespeare's own Bible," especially if experts agree to admit the genuineness of either or both the signatures. There are extant only two or three signatures of the Bard that are unquestionably his, and to possess the Book of Books, with his name written by his own hand, would be a treasure indeed. It is certain that the Bible to be offered is not that from which Shakespeare learnt his Scripture knowledge. It was apparently printed in 1613, and bears the imprint of the second edition of King James' Bible, our authorized version, the first issue of which was in 1611. In 1611 Shakespeare's dramatic work was done. It is doubtful if anything proceeded from his pen after that date except, perhaps, "Henry VIII.," which is only in part his, "The Tempest" and "Cymbeline." But, apart from this consideration, there is now little if any doubt that the Bible of the poet's youth and manhood was the Geneva version turned into English by the Reformers, first smuggled into this country in 1567, and afterwards freely and widely distributed. It was translated by Coverdale, Whittingham, Gilby, Goodman, Sampson Cole, and probably John Knox. Being cheap and specially favored by the Puritans, no fewer than 160 editions passed into circulation between 1560 and the Civil war. The Bibles which Shakespeare might have known were Coverdale's, the Bishops Wyckliffe's, Tyndale's, Cranmer's, the Rheims New Testament, and the Geneva; but the Rev. Dr. Carter, of Croydon, has proven almost beyond controversy that the version he actually knew and referred to was the Geneva.

Granting that the Geneva Bible was in all probability that from which the great dramatist learnt his earliest Scripture lessons, this in no way invalidates the belief that when the Authorized Version appeared he bought a copy.

Largest Troopship Built.

The Dufferin, a troopship of the Indian Government, has just been launched at Barrow from the yard of Messrs. Vickers, Sons & Maxim. She is 435 feet long, and is the largest troopship afloat. At short notice the Dufferin can be converted into an armed cruiser, having eight 4.7 guns and eight 3-pounder quick-firers. There is accommodation for 1,250 officers and men, with their wives and families. The speed of the vessel will be 18½ knots.
