

REPORT THAT JAPS HAVE ORDERS

To Attack Port Arthur
TomorrowAND CAPTURE IT AT ALL
HAZARDS.Mikado Has an Enormous
Army in Corea.RUSSIANS SEIZED AND RELEASED
BRITISH COAL LADEN
STEAMERS.

Liao Yang, Manchuria, Feb. 29.—Foreigners living at Yin Kow say that the Japanese fleet has received orders to attack and capture Port Arthur March 1st at all costs.

Japanese Losses—

St. Petersburg, Feb. 29.—The Courier de Tien Tsin says in spite of the Japanese measures to conceal their losses, it is known that the battleship Yashima and the cruisers Asama and Tokiwa have been to Nagasaki to repair the damage which they have sustained.

Czar Released Them.

Suez, Feb. 29th.—The Russian cruiser Aurora with five torpedo boats, has arrived here. The British coal laden steamers Eltrickdale (from Barry for Sabang) and Frankby (from Barry for Hong Kong) were brought here by the Russian vessels which captured both of them and also the Norwegian Strm Matilde, from Banarth for Desado, laden with coal have been released by order of the Czar.

Colombo, Island of Ceylon, Feb. 29th.—One of the vessels of the Russian volunteer cruiser fleet is reported to be cruising 370 miles west of Colombo.

To Assist the Wounded.

Moscow, Feb. 29.—A large representative meeting of the marshalls, nobility and chief government officials was held here yesterday to discuss the best methods of assisting the Russian wounded during the war in the far east.

At the close of the meeting a telegram was despatched to the Czar, expressing unbounded loyalty to him.

His Majesty immediately replied, expressing his hearty gratitude for the noble thought which inspired the message and the sentiments voiced towards himself adding:—"I see in these expressions new testimony of a determination on the part of the Russian nobles to serve their Emperor as they did in former days, and to work in common with the sons of Russia for the welfare of our dear fatherland."

Defend Port Arthur.

Paris, Feb. 29.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Echo de Paris says orders have been telegraphed to Port Arthur that that place be fortified and defended as completely as possible. The correspondent adds that he learned that Russia's fleet will leave the Black Sea, contrary to rumors appearing in foreign papers.

The Manchurian railway and telegraph lines are admirably guarded from Port Arthur to Mukden and from Mukden to Harbin.

The correspondent further says he is assured from high quarters that nothing is known concerning the rumor that foreign minister Lamedorf is to be replaced by the present Russian minister to Denmark.

Big Army in Corea.

New York, Feb. 29.—A cable from Che Foo to the Herald says that 120,000 Japanese troops have arrived at Seoul up to date, consisting of cavalry and infantry, but with no artillery, although 80,000 men have passed through Seoul, and 40,000 through Gensu within a fortnight, northward bound via Pink Yang.

The harbour of Chemulpo and the approaches to the mouth of the Han River, leading to Seoul are filled with submerged torpedoes, the army base being thereby protected from a sea attack. Japan fully controls Corea, and the government is rendering assistance in the military operations. The Korean army barracks and also the disused imperial palace are used as quarters for Japanese troops. There is much talk also of the

offensive and defensive alliance between Japan and Corea.

All Military Now.

Paris, Feb. 29.—The Matin's correspondent at Harbin says that the last passenger train to the southward over the Trans Siberian railway left yesterday, and that henceforth all mail and passenger cars for Port Arthur will be attached to the military trains. Traffic northward continues to be regular. The correspondent adds that snow is falling abundantly after several fine days.

Seoul, Feb. 29.—Details of a skirmish at Ping Yang last Friday show that fifty Russian cavalrymen approached the north gate of the Japanese camp and fired at a distance of one thousand metres. A sharp fusillade took place and the Russians retired. All foreigners are safe.

London, Feb. 29.—Vladivostok has been blockaded by a Japanese fleet since Thursday, according to a Daily Mail despatch from Hakodate, which adds that in-coming steamers report Russian cruisers on the east coast of Kinkwasan, in the Bay of Sandai, Japan.

Japanese warships have been reported in the vicinity of Vladovostok, but the report of a blockade, although considered probable, has not yet been confirmed from other sources.

Russia Mistrusts China.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 29.—Discussing the attitude of China, the Soviet today says it considers China is a secret ally of Japan, and that like America and Great Britain, she will do everything possible to injure Russia.

The Soviet anticipates China even really will be common open enemy and says the Russian authorities in the far east are already taking precautionary measures to ward off any sudden attack on the part of the Chinese.

NATIVE TROOPS REBEL

And Threaten to Drive Germans into the Sea.

Berlin, Feb. 29.—The native troops of the Cross and Nassang Rivers, region of German Kameroun, equatorial, West Africa have revolted.

Despatches received at the colonial office today say that several factories of the North West Kameroun Co. have been burned, and that four Germans were killed.

All the German African colonies are in a ferment over the statement spread by beres runners that the Germans are being driven into the sea.

A WOMAN KILLED.

Halifax, Feb. 29.—A terrible accident occurred on board the Allan liner, Bavarian, early Sunday morning. As the passengers and luggage were being landed, Mrs. T. J. Martin, aged about 50, who came out as assistant matron to 80 orphans from Mr. Birt's home, who are bound to Knowlton P. Q. while passing the fore-hatch on the second deck leaned against the canvas screen which was placed about the hatch, when the fastenings at the bottom of the screen gave way and she was hurled down the hold about 25 feet. Death was instantaneous, her head and chest being crushed in a horrible manner.

A MURDEROUS NEGRO.
