THE HOUSE OPENING.

Legislature will Meet For Despatch of Business on Thursday.

The provincial legislature will be formally opened by His Honor the lieutenant governor, with the usual ceremony at three o'clock on Thursday afternoon. His Honor will be attended by a guard of honor from No. 4 Company of the R.C.R. and the 71st regiment will furnish the band.

A detachment from the 10th Field Battery of Woodstock, consisting of two officers, two non-commissioned officers, and twelve gunners, will arrive here on Wednesday evening to fire the customary salute of fifteen guns. The detachment will be quartered at the barracks while here, and will return to Woodstock on Friday morning. They will bring with them a pair of nine pound field guns.

The lieutenant-governor will be attended by Lieut.-Col. White, D. O. C., Lieut.-Col. Wadmore, Lieut.-Col. Loggie, Capt. Winslow, A. D. C. and other officers of the active militia.

Caretaker Lister is now busy putting the assembly chamber in shape for the opening. The carpet has been laid down in the corridor and several handsome new floor rugs have been placed in the speaker's room. An incandescent electric light has been placed each side of the speaker's chair and an arc light has been installed over the main entrance to the building.

The only new member of the House is Mr. Cyprien Martin, of Madawaska, and he will probably occupy the desk on the left of the speaker, formerly used by his predecessor the late Mr. Gagnon.

The local government will meet here on Tuesday and Wednesday to prepare the program for the session. So far as can be learned at this stage there is not likely to be any very important legislation.

The lieutenant governor has issued invitations for the usual state dinner on Thursday evening.

Basket Ball.

There were two basket ball games at the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium on Saturday and both were witnessed by large and interested crowds of spectators. In the afternoon the Senior and Junior class teams of the University played the final game of the league series. The Juniors won after a hard fight by a score of 13-11. The Sophomores came out leaders in the league, having won every game. In the evening the Trojans and Normal School teams met in the city league series. This game, although rather one sided, proved very interesting. The Trojans came out victors by a score of 26-6. Great interest is being taken in the Trojans U. N. B. game which will be contested this week.

Three-Legged Runaway.

A horse attached to a sled, and belonging to the Glote Laundry, created some excitement this morning. The animal became frightened while standing near the laundry, and dashed through the alley to King street and then out St. John street. A hitching strap was attached to one of its forelegs, but this impediment seemed to make but little difference, and it put up a three-legged pace that was surprising to say the least. In front of A. E. Eardley's store, the sled overturned and several bundles of clothes were dumped into the gutter. A capture was effected by Joseph Christie near the Charlotte street school.

AMONG THE CURLERS.

Mr. Dibblee Won the Medal Match-Married Men Ahead of Bachelors.

All three sheets of ice at the curling rink were occupied Saturday evening, showing that interest in the sport which has been sustained to a remarkable degree throughout the winter, continues up to the close of the season.

On No. 1 ice Mr. Dibblee and Dr. Bridges struggled for the possession of four very pretty medals, in the concluding match B, series, managing committee games of last season. It was a hot game throughout and ended in the genial Clerk Assistant winning out by a score of 13 to 11, so that the medals will decorate the many breasts of Mr. Dibblee, and his associates, Mayor Palmer, Harry Bridges and Inspector Bridges. This quartette are very proud of their success, but Dr. Bridges and his men made the winners hustle till the last head of the game.
