

CHURCH SYNOD.

mentioned a new window placed in St. Luke's church in memory of three late church wardens.

Albert—Rev. A. W. Smithers—The report showed evidences of material as well as spiritual progress in this parish.

Sussex and Stodholm—Rev. Scovil Neales presented a report which was satisfactory.

Campobello—Rev. Mr. Rigby reported that the church services were regular and well attended. The buildings are in good estate and parish work generally excellent.

St. Mary's, St. John City—Rev. Dr. Raymond reported kindergarten, boy's brigade and Sunday school all flourishing. The church was free from debt and had lately installed a new organ. The communion work increased and work was on the whole encouraging.

McAdam—The report showed that the parish work had been backward but was now making some progress.

New Maryland—This parish is doing good work and the report was sent to the diocesan secretary.

After the reading of the parish reports which occupied all the evening, the session adjourned until Wednesday morning at ten o'clock.

A SUDDEN CALL.

John Chittick of Boiestown, Dropped Dead at St. Mary's.

John Chittick, a middle-aged man belonging to Boiestown, died very suddenly at Tomilson's Hotel, St. Mary's, this morning. He was taken ill while eating his breakfast and passed away in a few minutes. Coroner Rowley of Marysville, was called and after enquiring into the circumstances decided that an inquest would not be necessary. He gave permission to remove the body and it was afterwards brought to John G. Adams' undertaking rooms in this city and prepared for burial.

The deceased was about fifty years of age and is survived by a wife and family. He came to St. Mary's a few weeks ago and has been working for the Boom Company. He has been suffering from heart trouble for some time and that was undoubtedly the cause of his death. One of his sons is in camp at Sussex with the 71st regiment and is expected here this evening to accompany the remains to Boiestown for burial.

Summer School.

The Summer School for Sunday School workers in New Brunswick, being held under the auspices of the Presbyterian Synod of the maritime provinces opened in the Old Kirk last evening. There are about fifty delegates in attendance, representing different sections of the province. At the opening session Rev. Willard Macdonald led the devotional exercises and Prof. Walter C. Murray of Halifax, delivered an address on "Nature and Nurture." At this morning's session Rev. G. D. Ireland of Woodstock was the principal speaker, his subject being "Literature in the Bible."

The Tennis Tournament.

The Halifax team won a victory of three points in the tournament with Fredericton played here yesterday morning and afternoon. The series included men's and ladies' doubles, and mixed doubles, and in all except the men's singles the teams were a tie. The Fredericton players, considering their inexperience compared with the visitors, certainly made a splendid showing. The visitors were entertained to a drive about the city during the afternoon and afterwards had tea on the grounds. They left for home on the evening train.

Wilmot Park Board.

The trustees of Wilmot park held a meeting yesterday afternoon, but no business of great importance was transacted. It was decided to erect a new line fence between the park and the Odell property, the present one having outlived its usefulness. An offer of young trees from Mrs. G. W. Hodge, Mrs. F. A. H. Straton and Miss Quinn was accepted. It was voted to have some needed improvements made to the park in the near future, and also to give the caretaker some instructions in regard to the performance of his duties.

Organ Recital.

The new organ just installed in the Baptist church in this city will be formally opened on Monday evening, July 18th, with a recital by the organist, Mr. Wilmot Lemont. He will be assisted by Mr. L. W. Titus, the blind tenor of St. John. This will be the first organ recital heard in this city in some years and should attract a large audience.

Divorce Court.

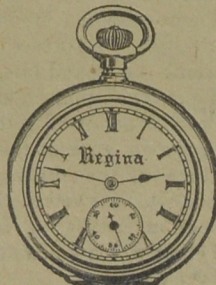
