

A BAD MESS.

Woman Arrested at
St. John for
Adultery.HAD BEEN LIVING WITH
MAN NOT HER HUSBANDWhose Wife Appeared on
the Scene.

MAN SKIPPED OUT.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. John, July 6.—Bessie Patience Hutchings of Newfoundland, aged 31, was arrested here today, and brought before the police court on the charge of adultery, having lived with Frederick Goss, carpenter, as his wife, notwithstanding they were never married and she knew Goss had a wife living in Boston, which wife appears is her aunt.

The present proceedings are brought by Mrs. Goss, who with her daughter reached here from Boston. The Hutchings woman made a direct answer to the charge and was remanded.

Mrs. Goss and her daughter were in court and the defendant admitted 'pro stare omni proque pignus vixit' which she had in court was hers by Goss, and she had two before, of whom Goss was the father, but they had died.

The woman cried bitterly.

Goss got word of his wife's coming and skipped out last night. He came here from Halifax about four years ago. It is said he belongs to Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, as well as the Hutchings woman. Goss is about sixty years old.

Two Montreal Business Men Wanted by the Police.

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JAP REVERSE.

Report that Russians
Won Naval Victory.OKU'S ARMY CONCENT-
RATING ON PORTReckless Daring of Japs'
Torpedo Boats.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Liao Yang, July 6.—There are persistent rumors in circulation that an engagement occurred today north of Gensan, between the Russian Vladivostock and a Japanese squadron which ended favorably to the Russians.

Liao Yang, July 6.—General Oku's army is retiring, evidently with the object of concentrating on Port Arthur.

Siege guns are being placed in position at Kin Chou.

The departure of two additional divisions for the seat of war is reported from Nagasaki, Japan.

St. Petersburg, July 6.—A few nights ago Admiral Togo attempted to repeat the Japanese exploit with torpedo boats at Wai Hai Wei, during the Chinese-Japanese war by sending torpedo boat destroyers into the harbor of Port Arthur, for the purpose of sinking ships at their anchorage, but the attempt ended in a disastrous failure.

Four torpedo boat destroyers succeeded in creeping into the harbor, which was not protected, and only one escaped. Two were sunk and one crippled.

The reckless bravery of the Japanese going to almost certain destruction, excites nothing but admiration here.
