Coun. Scott said he, was no lawyer, but he thought the men would have to be tried in the county where they were arrested.

Coun. McMullin asked for the opinion of the secretary treasurer in regard to the matter.

The secretary-treasurer said the reason the prisoners were brought to the Fredericton jail, was that they were arrested at McAdam Junction in the county of York. They had since been committed for trial, and should they be tried here, and there was no way for York County to get rid of the expense.

Coun. Cliff moved the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

"Whereas there are now lodged in the York County jail three persons, alleged to have committed a grievous crime against the laws of this Dominion; and

"Whereas, this is likely to be a costly affair to said County of York,

"Therefore we in semi-annual session now convened do direct our secretary-treasurer to call the attention of the attorney general to the injustice against the county aforesaid bearing the expense of examination of said prisoners and also of the trial."

Coun. Fawcett moved that the name of Harry Pickard be appointed a surveyor of wood for the Parish of Southampton.

Coun. Cliff said the law did not allow the appointment of officers at the July session without there was a vacancy. The motion was adopted.

County School Fund.

Coun. Grosvenor brought up the county school fund matter and referred to the act of last session as being high handed and would when the time come bring censure from the people of York upon those who were responsible for it. He was surprised when he read that such legislation had been passed. He had seen the statement in the press that the City of Fredericton supported a High School. That was not so the High School was supported by the people of the County of York. He did not think the government had any right to interfere with the school law, that had been in force thirty years; it was done simply because they wanted to throw a sop to the people of the city of Fredericton. The councillor spoke with considerable warmth and had a fling at the late chairman of the Board of Health and also the new Highway act before resuming his seat. He did not follow up his remarks with a motion, so nothing further was said on the subject.

Coun. Hinchey wanted the meeting adjourned until Wednesday morning to to allow an opportunity to discuss the highway act, but failed to get any support.

The reporters and constables were voted the usual fees.

The secretary treasurer read the minutes of the meeting after which the council adjourned sine die.

NEWFOUNDLAND WRECKERS.

Recent Stripping of a Stranded Schooner.
Recalls Some Ancient Lore.

It recalls old times to read of how a party of Newfoundland fishermen recently boarded and stripped a schooner that by some rare chance went ashore on their terrible coast without getting ground into little pieces. That was their regular custom in such cases in years not very remote, not because they were a bad, piratical lot, which they never were, but because that custom, once common to every seaboard, lingered in Newfoundland with many another of equally respectable age longer than in most other places. The Newfoundlanders—who, by the way, always accents the name of his island on the ultimate syllable and that of himself on the penultimate—retained until just the other day the inclination of his ancestors and ours to look upon lighthouses as a wicked interference with the designs of Providence in the matter of wrecks and consequent profit to a longshore population, and though it has been some years since he has been charged with actual efforts to increase the natural harvest of the cliff foot by luring ships ashore or quietly disposing of stray survivors who might be inconvenient claimants for salvaged property, it is not remarkable that he still decides hastily when the question arises whether a stranded vessel belongs to its owners or to the first to reach it. Which is a loss as well as a gain, since it means the complete disappearance of a phase of life of large value to the artists of one sort and another who have been wont to earn honest bread by exploiting humanity's interest in the tragical land picturesque.

Greatest, Yet Poorest of Men.

Rev. James L. Gordon, in Bond Street Congregational Church, Toronto, on Sunday said: The world has had five great teachers—Moses, Buddha, Confucius, Mohammed and Jesus, the peerless personality of all history. The life of Jesus stretches from the lowest material realm to the highest spiritual realm, and the seven great events of that life were His incarnation, manifestation in the temple, temptation in the wilderness, transfiguration on the mount, crucifixion, resurrection and ascension. Emerson says of Christ: "He was the greatest and the poorest man among the men of history." He was rocked in a borrowed cradle, and buried in a borrowed tomb. Jesus in His crucifixion deals with five great mysteries of life—the mysteries of pain, shame, sin, death and unknown eternity. Measure the tomb of Jesus by the divine rod of measurement, and you find it in its length equal to eternity, in width to the human race, and in depth to the need of the human heart, and in the dome that overarches it, a height as great as the throne of the infinite.

The World's Water Power.

John C. Hawkshaw, president of the Institute of Civil Engineers, has calculated the total water power of the world to be equivalent to 10,340,000,000 horse-power (apparently annually). To obtain this figure he assumes a rainfall of ten inches to flow off every square inch of land and places the mean height at 2,250 feet above sea level. "Our present yearly output of 225,000,000 tons of coal would give that horse-power for only a little over half a day."

Newfoundland's Trade.

In view of the probability of Newfoundland soon becoming a Province of the Dominion, its trade statistics will be of interest to Canadian manufacturers. The latest figures at hand are those for the fiscal year 1902. In that year Newfoundland's total foreign trade amounted to \$17,389,209 as compared with a trade of \$10,415,796 for the fiscal year 1898, an increase of over 66 per cent. in four years. The imports were valued at \$5,188,863 in 1898 and at \$7,836,685 in 1902, an increase of over 51 per cent., while the exports were valued at \$5,226,933 in 1898 and at \$9,552,524 in 1902, an increase of over 82 per cent. in four years. In 1898 the exports exceeded the imports by \$38,070; in 1902 the exports exceeded the imports by \$1,615,839.
