HAD FUN WITH TARTE.

Mr. Foster appears to have had a good deal of fun at the expense of Mr. Tarte when the two gentlemen met at the Canadian club dinner at Toronto last week. The ex-Minister of Public Works apparently took his roasting very good naturedly, but how effectively he might have replied to the ex-Finance Minister on the subject of wandering.

Mr. Tarte could have instanced the Hon. George's travelling from constituency to constituency and province to province looking for a safe seat and finding none; how he started out in Kings, wandered up to York, then to St. John and lastly to North Ontario, and still he is not in Parliament.

Mr. Tarte might also have recalled Mr. Foster's travels to different points of the temperance and prohibition question, his moment of weakness and his \$10 a night jaunts to the cross roads school houses of Canada.

We fear Mr. Tarte has little sense of the humorous, or he could very effectively have boistered Mr. Foster on his own petard, and covered him with confusion. Mr. Tarte was entirely too slow and had the laugh turned on him by Mr. Foster's keen, yet good natured thrusts.

The New Year has opened with a series of awful disasters by sea and land, the wreck of the steamer Clallam running on the route between Victoria, B. C., and Seattle, by which fifty-one lives were lost, being the worst yet reported. The Herald has good reasons for fearing that Fredericton has a special interest in the awful disaster, as one of the passengers lost is Mr. N. P. Shaw, a former Carleton county man, and the husband of the eldest daughter of Mr. C. H. Lugin, of Victoria, a former well known resident of this city.

Mr. H. J. Logan, M. P. for Cumberland, told the Montreal Herald that there is every probability that the government will carry at least fifteen of the nineteen seats in Nova Scotia, ten of the thirteen in New Brunswick, three of the four in Prince Edward Island, and will come out of the maritime provinces with a majority of twenty seats. This is somewhat different from the Tory estimate, but it is nearer the mark.

Hon. H. A. McKeown is to address Liberal meetings at Picton and New Glasgow on the 19th inst. after the Liberal nominating convention has completed its business. The party's choice of a candidate in Picton will undoubtedly be Mr. E. M. Macdonald, M. P. P., well known in this city as an effective stumpster and a very estimable gentleman.

The Conservatives of Kings and Albert a few years ago put up two such eminent public men as Mr. Foster and Dr. Weldon for seats in Parliament and it is quite a descent to Mr. Fowler for the united counties.

Ottawa advises continue to represent the general belief there that another session of the Dominion Parliament will be held before the elections are called on.

TWO OF THE VICTIMS

Of the Awful Shipping Tragedy on Pacific Coast.

Mr. Nathaniel P. Shaw, shipowner of Victoria, B. C., who is reported lost in the steamship Clallam disaster on the Pacific coast, particulars of which are given elsewhere, is a native of Carleton county and a nephew of the late R. K. Jones, ex-M. P. P. of Woodstock. The deceased's wife who survives him

was formerly Miss Gertrude Lugin, eldest daughter of Mr. Charles H. Lugin, formerly of this city. He also leaves one child, a boy of 6. The numerous Fredericton friends of Mrs. Shaw and her family will most sincerely sympathize with her and them in their great sorrow.

A Moncton despatch to the Herald this afternoon says:

"Among the reported lost in the wreck of the Steamer Clallam, is Harvey Sears, a native of Sackville, a seaman on the lost steamer.

The deceased was a son of Harley Sears of the Intercolonial baggage department here.

Mr. Sears this morning received a telegram from another son Albert, in Victoria, telling of the loss of the steamer, and stating that Harvey had not been reported.

Harvey Sears was twenty-four years of age, and well known at Sackville, where he lived the greater part of his life before going west.

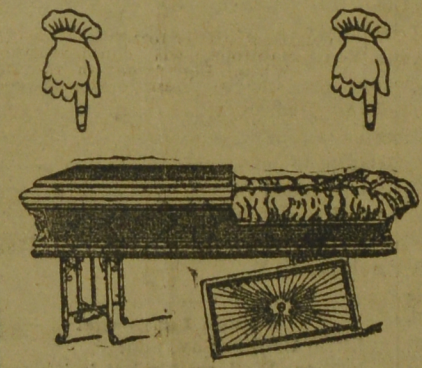
