ment furnishes the trees, gives the instructions and mental assistance necessary, together with a spray pump and some other necessary implements in order that proper work may be done, and keeps the partner up to his part of the agreement, it will have done pretty well its share.

I think we have in every county of New Brunswick plenty of capable men willing to co-operate with the department of agriculture, and make this enterprise a success. There is no doubt in my mind but that this will prove a valuable investment, but the one who undertakes it must make up his mind that he has the largest outlay, not the government; but he makes all the gain, and profits there will be without a doubt.

For the success of this scheme the greatest difficulty seems to be to get the orchard located where they will get proper attention at the right time. Other farm work pressing on one's hands may make a great difference in the amount put on the orchards, and consequently the results obtained may not be satisfactory to anyone. Success with every orchard is not anticipated, unavoidable mistakes will be made, but such should not detract
