DEATHS AND BURIALS.

Mrs. Alexander McCausland Called to Her Reward.

The death occurred at her home on Northumberland street last night of Mrs. McCausland, widow of the late Alexander McCausland. Her death was due to an attack of la grippe and occurred after a brief illness. She had reached the advanced age of 88 years, and is survived by one son, Mr. Frank J. McCausland, accountant for Mr. J. J. Weddall & Son, and one daughter, Miss Minnie McCausland at home. Her maiden name was Hendry and she was a native of Cambridge, Queens county. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon, with services by Rev. J. A. Rogers. Interment will be made at the old burying ground. Undertaker George W. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Mary E. Fisher took place from her late home at Marysville on Saturday afternoon and despite the stormy weather was largely attended. Services were conducted at the house by Rev. R. S. Crisp, and interment was made in the Methodist cemetery, Undertaker R. B. Adams was in charge of the arrangements.

The remains of the late William McNeill of St. Mary's were taken to Nashuaak Village this morning. The funeral services were conducted at the house by Rev. James Crisp. Undertaker R. B. Adams had charge of the arrangements.

The death occurred at the Victoria Hospital on Saturday evening of Mrs. Mary Ann McGrath, widow of the late Thomas McGrath. She was 66 years of age. The remains were interred at the Hermitage this afternoon, services being held at St. Dunstan's church. Robert B. Adams was the officiating undertaker.

The funeral of Mrs. Laurence Rideout took place from her late residence, Gibson, at 2 o'clock this afternoon and was very largely attended. Services were conducted at the house and grave by Rev. J. C. Wilson of the Free Baptist church, of which the deceased was an esteemed member. Rev. W. R. Robinson assisted at the services. Interment was at Sonny Bank, John G. Adams being the undertaker with Harry Adams in charge.

Roads Blocked.

The roads in the country are impassable in a number of places as a result of the recent severe snowstorm. At several points between this city and Hawke's Bay, the snow is piled up to a depth of ten feet. Macpherson's stage from Meductic, carrying His Majesty's mails, was compelled to tie up at Lower Prince William Saturday night on account of the state of the roads, and did not reach the city until noon today. The roads in the parish of Lincoln are badly blocked and teams have to take to the fields. So far there has been no serious interruption to traffic on the railways.

In a New Role.

A London despatch says: The Marchioness of Donegal—who was Miss Violet Twining, of Fredericton, N. B., before her marriage to the octogenarian Marquis—has come into prominence at Brighton, England. The Late Storm.

KICKED BY A HORSE.

Isaac Moore of Penniac Receives Injuries Which May Prove Fatal.

Isaac Moore, a young man belonging to Penniac and son of Mr. William Moore of that place, is lying at the point of death at his home as the result of injuries inflicted by a horse yesterday. It appears that he was at work cleaning the animal in the stable, when without the slightest warning it let drive one of its hind feet and caught him squarely in the face. The force of the blow rendered him unconscious and he remained in that condition for some time. Some children playing about the barn reported the accident, and the unfortunate young man was removed to the house and made as comfortable as possible until Dr. H. H. McNally reached the scene in response to a telephone message. An examination disclosed the fact that the young man had sustained injuries of a most frightful nature. His jaw bone had been broken in several places, and his face had been badly cut by the sharp caulk of the horse's shoe. The doctor found it necessary to remove two pieces of bone, and it required a number of stitches to close the wounds. The condition of the patient is quite critical, but the doctor is not without hope of saving his life.
