The following general financial statement of the Y. M. C. A. is submitted for the period from Nov. 1902 to Feb. 1904, showing the receipts from rents and subscriptions to the building fund, together with the expenditure for the same term.

This statement does not include the receipts and expenditure on current account, a full statement of which will be given at the close of the association year.

The association aimed to raise \$9500, with which to clear off the entire debt against it. Pledges were secured for \$7584 70.

## OUR MONCTON BUDGET.

City Clerk Cannot be Sworn In till New Mayor is Elected—Appeal to Privy Council.

Moncton, May 16.—Chester Sullivan, formerly of the I. C. R. shops here, is critically ill at Calgary.

J. H. Thompson, I. C. R. brakeman, received a telegram this morn-

ing announcing that the condition of Mrs. Thompson, who is in the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, is very alarming. Mr. Thompson left this afternoon for Montreal.

James Friel, barrister of Dorchester, returned this morning from Ottawa, where he was in connection with the case of Emmerson vs. Maddison. It will be remembered that the decision in the New Brunswick supreme court was reversed by the supreme court of Canada. It is understood the case will be appealed to the Privy Council.

The city council meets this afternoon at the call of three aldermen, and it is understood that the council will name Monday, May 31, as the day of election for the mayoralty.

City Clerk Magee elect, cannot be sworn until a new mayor is elected, owing to no provision in the act of incorporation for such swearing in by other than the mayor.

## YESTERDAY'S WAR NEWS.

## Proposed Christian Church.

London, May 16.—The Daily Telegraph's Tokio correspondent cables the following under yesterday's date: "A great religious meeting promoted by influential men was held in the pro-Christian in character, but on park today to determine the question of founding in Japan a church independent lines. Leading men consider that the time has arrived to adopt the elements approved by the majority of civilized people. An edict establishing a national church is not improbable."

## Fight with Bandits.

Liao Yang, Saturday, May 14 (delayed in transmission).—Chinese bandits are becoming bolder and are causing considerable trouble to the Russian outposts. A swarm of the bandits at noon of May 13 attacked the coal mines on the branch line east of Yantse station, 7 miles north of Liao Yang. The mines, which supply the whole railroad, were guarded by 200 riflemen and 100 Cossacks. In a fierce fight the Russians repelled the bandits and then charged them, the bandits fleeing to the hills and to the neighboring villages. The troops surrounded the villages and demanded the surrender of the bandits. The surrender was at first refused, but fearing that the Russians would destroy their homes the villagers finally revealed the hiding places of the fugitives. The bandits fought with the desperation of entrapped rats and fifty of them were speared and killed. The Russians suffered no loss. Among seventeen prisoners taken by the troops were two Japanese officers who had escaped from the Russians. One of the bandits taken prisoner confessed that the bandits had been hired by the Japanese, whom they were supplying with information.

London, May 16.—No confirmation has reached London of the rumors of a great battle at Sin Yen and no attention whatever is paid to the wild reports of the fall of Port Arthur. In Japanese quarters here confidence is expressed that a great assault upon that fortress will be attempted before the end of May.

## Gossip from Chee Foo.

Chee Foo, May, 16.—Well informed Chinese say that the entrance to Port Arthur is blocked.

A combined attack on Port Arthur by land and sea is expected to take place between, May 20, and May 23. The Japanese expect to occupy Port Dahn within a few days.

After the destruction of the submarine mines at Talien Wan, the Japanese intend to land additional troops there and commence the attack on Port Arthur.
