

DONEGAL DEAD.

Aged Lord who Married Former Frederickton Lady

PASSES AWAY AT THE RIPE AGE OF EIGHTY-TWO.

Leaves a Son to Inherit Title and Estates.

London, May 15.—George Augustus Hamilton Chichester, fifth Marquis of Donegal, is dead. He was born July 27, 1822.

The Marquis of Donegal was married December 23, 1902, to Miss Violet Twining, of Fredericton, (N. B.) who was twenty-two years old at the time. On Oct. 8, 1903, a son and heir was born to the marquis, who had twice previously been married without having issue.

[The announcement of Lord Donegal's death is of special interest to Fredericton as his widow is well known in this city where she spent some years with her mother Mrs. H. St. George Twining, formerly of Halifax, and the owner of considerable property in this city. The Marchioness when yet Miss Twining was presented to court by Lord and Lady Strathcona and shortly afterwards her marriage to the aged Marquis created considerable of a sensation, heightened later by the news of the birth of a son and heir to the couple.]

It is safe to say that the marriage of Miss Violet Twining, formerly of this city, to the Marquis of Donegal, which was celebrated in London on Tuesday, created considerable of a sensation in Fredericton, where the bride and her mother are so well known.

The great disparity in the ages of the bride and bridegroom, was the subject of much comment. The new marchioness is not over twenty-two, while her distinguished husband is eighty and has been twice married before seeking the hand of the fair young Canadian.

If Miss Twining was looking for an alliance with an ancient family and abundance of titles she has had her wish verified, for Lord Donegal's family as ennobled dates back nearly 300 years.

The first noble of the House of Donegal was created viscount and baron in 1625, Earl of Donegal, 1647, Marquis of Donegal, and Earl of Belfast, 1791, Irish honors; Baron Fisherwick in Great Britain, 1790, and Baron Enishowen and Carrickfergus 1841. Motto—Memento Sequitur honor: Honor follows against his will. Seats, Hyde Park, Downshire and Arneau, and Fisherwick Lodge, Antrim and 22 Grosvenor Square, London.

The present marquis is the fifth of the line and was born June 27th, 1822, so that he is well on in his 81st year. His family name and titles are:

George Augustus Hamilton Chichester, Marquis of Donegal and Earl of Belfast, (1791), Earl of Donegal (1647), Viscount Chichester and Carrickfergus and Baron of Belfast, (1625) Baron Chichester of Belfast (1812), sits at Baron Fisherwick, Great Britain, (1790). He was formerly lieutenant in the 6th regiment of foot and is a son of the 4th marquis. He was born June 27, 1822, and succeeded to the title in 1899. He married in 1865, after the annulment of his first marriage, Mary Ann Williams, daughter of Edward Copp, Esq., of Kensington. The heir at present is his brother Lord Henry Fitzwarren, born in 1834.

A Short Wooing.

A London cable to the New York Herald says: Just five weeks ago the Marquis of Donegal, who all his life has been a head of the old school, was presented to the beautiful Canadian, Miss Violet Twining, who created quite a sensation when she was presented at the King's first court by Lady Strathcona, wife of the High Commissioner for Canada. An intimate friend of the Marquis says that his brother, Henry Fitzwarren, who in the absence of a direct heir has regarded himself for years as the successor to the title, opposed the wedding in every possible way. The Marquis was introduced to Miss Twining at a tea at the Isthmian Club, by Col. A. J. Gordon Kane, an old friend. Admiration soon developed into a deeper feel-

ing, and the Marquis wooed swiftly and successfully. The Marquis is looking remarkably young for his years, and seems quite the happy bridegroom. Col. Kane, who was one of the witnesses at the registrar's, arranged the marriage ceremony.

THE RIVER.

A Drop of (Eighteen Inches Here) Since Saturday.

The water in the river at this point has fallen eighteen inches since six o'clock Saturday evening. It fell a foot from Saturday evening to Sunday evening and about six inches during last night. It is still falling at about the same rate, though it is likely that the rain storm which set in early this morning will check it somewhat.

A strong northern wind prevailed during yesterday and there were very few logs running into the booms. It is supposed that many were blown ashore at points further up the river.

The weather here today has been very cloudy and wet, and it looks as if another heavy rain storm was in order. There is nothing new today from the lumber drives on the upper St. John, but the supposition is that they have plenty of water and are coming along all right.

The following weather reports were received over the Western Union wires at noon today:

Edmundston—Weather cool, cloudy, east wind, river falling quite fast, no logs running.

Aroostook—Water been falling fast, few logs running.

Blackville—Water falling fast, but still high, wet drizzling rain.

Aroostook—River fell 1½ feet since Saturday night; very few logs running.

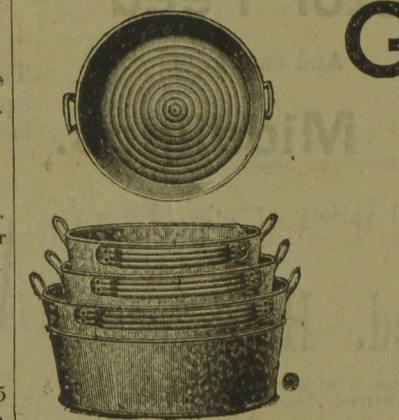
