LOST HIS FATHER.

Mr. R. P. Allen of the Herald Staff Has Sad News from Home.

Mr. R. P. Allen, city editor of The Herald, this morning received the sad news of the death of his father Mr. Lewis B. Allen, a prominent and respected citizen of Amherst, N. S., and leaves this evening for his home to attend the funeral, which takes place tomorrow afternoon.

The late Mr. Allen whose death occurred last night, up to four weeks ago was a strong and active man for his years—he was seventy one—but while acting as government inspector of the construction of new wharfat Fort Lawrence, caught cold which developed into rheumatic fever and eventually carried him off.

The deceased gentleman was a native of Allandale, Shelburn Co. N. S., but has been a resident of Amherst for the past twenty-five years. He is survived by a widow, daughter of the late Rev. Dr. Silas T. Rand the famous missionary, author and linguist, and by seven sons and three daughters. Four of the former live in Boston, all the daughters are married, two of them being residents in Amherst, and the other at New York.

The friends of Mr. R. P. Allen in Fredericton will unite with the Herald in sympathy for him in his bereavement.

A CENTENARIAN.

Former Fredericton Man Celebrates One Hundredth Anniversary of His Birth.

A Belfast, Maine, despatch says: Eli Cook, a former well known old time axemaker of Fredericton, N. B., celebrated his 100th birthday at his home on Bridge street Saturday. He is still in comfortable health.

He was born in Dixmont Corner and his early boyhood was spent in the woods boiling down hard wood for potash, then worth \$180 a ton at Bangor. He then learned the blacksmith's trade and became an expert axemaker, going to Fredericton, where he engaged in the business. From Fredericton he went to Frankford, Me., and North Dixmont and worked at his trade of blacksmithing for forty years. He has had five wives and has lived with his last wife forty-five years. He was in the Aroostook war, serving three months.
