

## UP AGAINST IT.

### Dominion Parliament Dissolved and

### GENERAL ELECTIONS ORDERED.

Nomination Oct. 27, Polling Nov. 3rd.

### CARTWRIGHT FOR THE SENATE — OTHER APPOINTMENTS.

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—The dissolution of the Dominion parliament took place at 6 o'clock last evening.

Nominations will take place on Oct. 27th and polling on Thursday, Nov. 3rd, a week later.

The writs are made returnable December 15.

All the arrangements for the contest have been completed. The returning officers have been selected and the writs have been prepared and ready to be forwarded.

Advices in the hands of the government are that wherever the Liberal candidates have not been selected, it is because there was a desire in these constituencies to know the date of the election first, the men being ready to be placed in the field. There are considerably more Liberals nominated than Conservatives, and of course, there are over fifty more Liberals in the house than Conservatives.

There are 213 members of parliament in the house which has just been dissolved, and there will be 214 in the new house. The last parliament was elected on November 7, 1900, and it has therefore been dissolved one year ahead of time.

This has been found necessary because of the redistribution of seats by the bill of last session, which has changed the representation of the different provinces, except Quebec, which always remains the same with its 65 members.

An order in council has been passed appointing Sir Richard Cartwright to the senate in place of the late Senator Aiken.

Some judicial appointments, which have already been talked over, were made yesterday: Justice Routhier, of the Supreme Court of Quebec, was promoted to the chief justiceship, in the place of Sir L. N. Casault, who has retired.

Sir C. A. P. Pelletier, senator, has been appointed in the place of Routhier, and Justice Choquette retires from the bench and takes the place of Senator Pelletier in the upper chamber as the French leader of the Quebec district.

The appointment of Dr. Russell, to the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia has not yet been made public, but it is understood that it has been agreed upon.

### JAPS GETTING READY.

### To Resume Active Work of the Campaign.

Mukden, Sept. 30.—The delay in resumption of aggressive action by Field Marshall Oyama, according to the best information, is due to the necessity of making good losses which were sustained at Liao Yang, and to the bringing up of stores and ammunition.

But preparations for an active forward movement of the Japanese now seem to have been completed, and a serious collision is regarded as imminent.

General Kuropatkin today reviewed several detachments of troops which have just arrived here, and conferred the St. George's cross upon eighteen officers who distinguished themselves at the battle of Liao Yang.
