

G. T. P. SURVEY

Some Changes Made In Route Assigned.

A LINE WILL BE RUN FROM BOIESTOWN TO PLASTER ROCK.

As Well as up the St. John Valley.

Moncton Transcript, Thursday.—It has been thought advisable for the Transcontinental surveyors to go ahead with the survey of the Northern route through New Brunswick at the same time of the survey along the St. John river. It was found that the survey along the river was somewhat condensed, bringing the different parties comparatively near each other. Six will be left surveying along the St. John river and four parties will be sent farther into the interior of the country.

It was at first arranged to survey the different lines touching at Fredericton, Woodstock and other places along the river and go into the interior of the province after completing the river route. Under the present arrangements the parties surveying between Chipman and Boiestown will begin at the same time as the other surveyors.

The different lines that will be surveyed in the central portion of New Brunswick will all have Moncton as their Eastern terminus.

The intention is for the surveying parties to explore the country thoroughly, acquiring complete information relative to grades, etc. Although part of the country has been previously surveyed, the Transcontinental surveyors will gather their own facts. Several lines will be run and the data of the engineers will all be carefully noted and submitted before there can be an idea formed as to the location of the road.

District Engineer Dunn, when seen by a Transcript reporter this afternoon, said it had been decided to assign four parties to the survey of the Northern route via Plaster Rock and Boiestown and they will carry on this survey at the time of the survey along the river route. In order to do this it is necessary to make some changes in the position of the parties already assigned.

Mr. Dunn says the list of the parties and their places on the survey has been amended and is now made up as follows:—

Party No. 1, Engineer Weatherbe, Moncton towards Chipman.
Party No. 2, Engineer D. W. Burpee, Chipman towards Moncton.
Party No. 3, Engineer H. W. Balkam, Chipman towards Fredericton.
Party No. 4, Engineer C. O. Foss, Fredericton towards Woodstock.
Party No. 5, Engineer Chas. Garden, Woodstock towards Fredericton.
Party No. 6, Engineer G. R. Ballock, Chipman towards Moncton.
Party No. 7, Engineer K. McIntosh, Boiestown towards Plaster Rock.
Party No. 8, Engineer D. F. Maxwell, Plaster Rock towards Boiestown.
Party No. 9, Engineer H. Longley, Plaster Rock towards Grand Falls.
Party No. 10, Engineer H. LEB. Miles, Edmundston Westward.

Dr. Murphy will have charge of a party for bridge surveys.
Engineer McIntosh and party leave for Boiestown this afternoon.

Engineer Burpee goes to Chipman tonight and will be ready to begin work on the survey towards Moncton tomorrow.

The camping outfit and supplies for the Grand Trunk survey party to operate from this city, have arrived, and it is likely that the men will begin work tomorrow morning. Mr. C. O. Foss, who is the engineer in charge of the party, is expected to reach here this evening. The first camp will be established at some point in the neighborhood of Springhill, and the route of the St. John valley railway survey will likely be followed as far as that point.

Mr. D. W. Burpee, C. E., of Sheffield, who is to have charge of the survey from Chipman, is now in the city, making arrangements to commence work.

ELEVEN MINERS KILLED.

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ANOTHER CONVERT.

President of Montreal Tory Club.

JOINS THE GOVERNMENT FORCES.

Tories Lack Leaders, Or- ganization and Policy.

Montreal, Sept. 30.—Another prominent Conservative has been forced to sever his connection with his party and throw in his lot with the Liberals, in the person of Mr. Gustave Boissonnault, the well known lawyer, who for years has been a stalwart Conservative worker in St. Johns and Beauharnois, and until a few months ago was president of the Morin Club. Owing to his disagreement with the course of the Conservative leaders, Mr. Boissonnault resigned the presidency of the political club.

The chief reasons given by Mr. Boissonnault for his changed political faith are admiration for the Grand Trunk Pacific project, and disgust at the lack of policy exhibited by the Conservative leaders. Another reason why Mr. Boissonnault left his former party was his indignation at the campaign of abuse against Sir Wilfrid Laurier which is being waged by the French-Canadian Conservative leaders.

Mr. Boissonnault, in explaining his change, said he could not but regard the G. T. P. as a work of national importance, which would undoubtedly prove of immense benefit to every part of the Dominion.

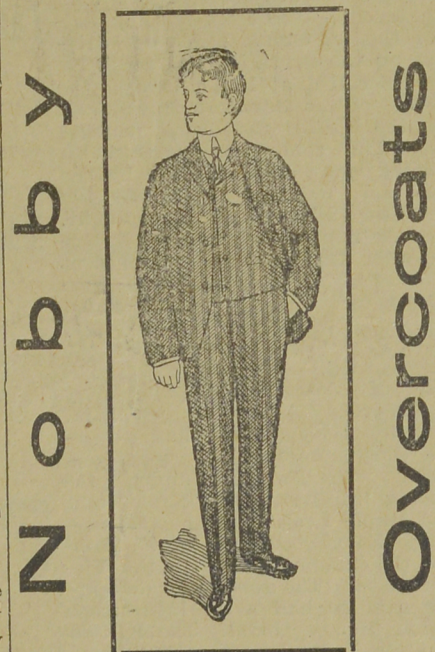
"The Conservatives, who built the C. P. R.," said he, "should know better than to attack the government on this project. I agree absolutely with Sir Wilfrid Laurier's views as to the necessity of the new road, and hope that his predictions of its early completion will be realized."

"Then the Conservative leaders make the mistake of imagining that because they talk protection to the limit, they have a policy. They have seen the failure of too extreme protection, yet they persist in favoring this idea."

"On the other hand the Liberal party have modified their extreme free trade views, and have first discovered what were the needs of the country, and then framed their policy so as to best serve them. Sir Wilfrid Laurier knows the needs of his country, and has devised a policy, marvellously adopted to meet the demands of the times. We do not need extremes in Canada—neither free trade nor wild protection, and as long as the Conservatives continue to preach the latter doctrine they will face defeat at the polls. The Conservative party today simply lacks leaders, organization, policy and speakers. No wonder it is fallen from its old time influence."
