The finance committee of the city council met in the office of the city treasurer last evening, and decided to adopt rigid measure to collect the back taxes due the city. The treasurer was instructed to at once issue executions against all rate-payers who are in arrears for the year 1903 and previous years.

Big Game Hunters.

Dr. E. H. Ashcraft and Mr. James McConeghy of Connersport, Pa., arrived here by the late train last evening on their way to the Southwest Miramichi on a moose hunting trip. They spent the night at Long's Hotel and took their departure for Stanley by the early train this morning. William Griffin, jr., of Cross Creek, has been engaged by them as guide.

Returned to New Brunswick.

Mr. John S. Lenihan, C. E., son of Mr. Daniel Lenihan, King street, has returned from the west where he went a few weeks ago to accept a position. Mr. Lenihan went as far west as Port Arthur when he received a telegram of his appointment to the G. T. P. survey and asking him to report for duty at Moncton. He arrived at Moncton this week and expects to be assigned to a territory in the province.

Heavy Rain Storm.

The heavy and protracted rainfall of last night seems to have extended to the upper section of the province, and a substantial rise of water looked for during the next few days. The river rose here four inches last night, and is coming up today at about the same rate. The balance of the corporation drive is coming along well and should be into the boom limits by the last of next week. There is between three and four million feet in the drive.

Election Talk.

The announcement that the House of Commons had been dissolved did not create a great deal of surprise here as

everybody seemed to be expecting it. The Liberals believe the time is very opportune for an expression of opinion at the polls and anticipate a great victory for the government. One well known Liberal, who does business on Queen street, said this morning that he was willing to wager \$100 to \$75 that the government will be sustained by a majority of not less than 45.

Still at Liberty.

Jailer Hawthorn who has been out the lines as far as McAdam Junction, searching for Grant, the escaped pickpocket, returned home by the noon train today. He made a thorough search and interviewed a number of the railway employes and farmers whom he met, but failed to get the slightest clue that would be likely to lead to the discovery of the refugee. Grant enjoys the distinction of being the first prisoner to escape from the county jail during the long period of twenty-two years that Mr. Hawthorn has been in charge of the institution. Mr. Hawthorn naturally feels very badly over the affair, and is doing everything in his power to recapture his late guest.

Accident to a Guide.

Mr. W. H. Allen, the well known guide of Penniac, had the misfortune to cut himself quite severely in the woods near the head of Little River yesterday morning. He was whittling kindling wood with a sharp hunting knife, and it chancing to slip, made a deep gash in his left thigh just above the knee. After bandaging the wound, which was a very painful one, and bled profusely, he boarded a team and drove to his home, a distance of twenty-two miles, and thence to this city, where he had it dressed by a physician. Although somewhat crippled as a result of the injury, Mr. Allen is preparing to return to the woods on Monday with a hunting party.

An Important Trial.

The October term of the York County court opens here on Tuesday next, Judge Wilson presiding. The most important case on the docket will be that of the alleged pickpockets, Williams and Howard, who are accused of robbing visitors to the Champlain celebration in June last. It is understood that Mr. J. H. Barry, K. C., will conduct the prosecution, and Hon. H. A. McKown, K. C., and Mr. H. F. McLeod will defend the prisoners. Prof. Ami of the geological survey, Ottawa and Baron de Halewyn, secretary to the French consul general, Montreal, have been subpoenaed as witnesses.
