

A CYCLONE.

Heeled a Steamer Over in Lake Ontario.

AND PARTIALLY FILLED HER WITH WATER.

Considerable Damage to Buildings and Crops.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Brockville, Ont., July 13.—A thunder storm verging on a cyclone and accompanied by a veritable cloud burst, passed over this section yesterday.

The storm caught the Steamer Island Belle, plying between Clayton and Ogdensburg, three miles west of Ogdensburg and almost sent her to the bottom.

The vessel keeled over on her side until the water was rushing across her deck. In this position she lay for a minute or more when she righted again with ten inches of water in her hold.

The incident created a panic among the passengers, all of whom clothed themselves with life preservers. Several women fainted.

The gale unroofed barns and blew down trees in all directions.

REV. PRINCIPAL FALCONER

THAT TRIPLE DROWNING.

American Marine Displayed Great Hero- ism in Attempt to Save Life of St. John People.

Particulars of the drowning of Captain G. W. Peck, his wife and daughter, on St. John, at Dry Tortugas, Fla., on Saturday last, are to the effect that the captain and his family in company with several American naval men went for a boat sail. A sudden squall struck the boat, and it at once capsized.

The official account of the accident, forwarded by Captain Frier, of the United States Navy, commanding that station, is based on the story of two survivors, and is a tale of bravery, lending additional lustre to the uniform of the American navy, says a Key West despatch to the Boston Herald.

Captain Peck, in command of the collier Mac, with a cargo of coal from Newport News for the government, arrived several days ago. Desiring to give his family a sail in the harbor of Dry Tortugas, he took his wife and handsome daughter, and accompanied by two marines from Fort Jefferson, Corporal Gologly and Private Smith to assist in handling the dinghy, started on what promised to be a pleasant excursion.

Under a favorable breeze the little craft was soon skipping over the water toward Outer reef, which they had scarcely crossed south of Garden Key, when a sudden squall upset the craft, throwing the five occupants into the water. Private Smith, the only one who could swim, succeeded after great efforts in getting his companions back to the boat, which had turned bottom side up.

As one by one dropped off the slip-

ery bottom from exhaustion, Private Smith would swim out and bring them back, and with words of encouragement, try to instil new life. The test of human endurance, however, was soon reached. Captain Peck's daughter lost her hold for the last time and sank from exhaustion before assistance could again reach her and her body was carried away by a strong current.

Captain Peck was the next to go. His wife, who had struggled hard to retain hold of the slippery keel of the dinghy, had already sunk once, when she was caught by Corporal Gologly, and was thus held in the water at the risk of his own life, when two marines, who had been fishing in the vicinity and had witnessed the capsizing of the boat, came to their assistance.

Private Smith was hauled aboard more dead than alive. Corporal Gologly, with one hand holding on to the keel and the other grasping tenaciously the lifeless form of Mrs. Peck, was next rescued. Captain Peck's body, face downward, was found floating a short distance off, while the body of his daughter was discovered about an hour afterward, drifting with the current toward the Gulf.
