A WINNER.

The Liberals of Colchester, N. S., met in convention yesterday at Truro, and unanimously selected Hon. F. A. Lawrence, M. P. P., speaker of the Nova Scotia Legislature, as their candidate for the House of Commons, and Mr. Lawrence will no doubt accept the honor.

The selection is a very happy one, and the indications point to the redemption of the constituency from the Tories.

Colchester is at present represented by Mr. S. E. Gourley, who has gained considerable notoriety by his eccentric speeches in Parliament. He enjoys a degree of popularity, and is a very energetic canvasser, but Mr. Lawrence, with anything like efficient organization, should win by a substantial majority.

Colchester for many years was regarded as a pretty safe Tory constituency, and election after election it returned Conservatives to both the federal and local parliaments. Its first representative at Ottawa after confederation was the late Hon. A. W. McLellan, as an anti-confederate, but in 1869, on his acceptance of a senatorship and the position of commissioner for the construction of the I. C. R., the late Hon. A. G. Archibald, whom Mr. McLellan defeated in 1867, was elected, holding the seat until he became governor of Manitoba in 1870. The late F. M. Pearson, a Liberal, whose son, Mr. B. F. Pearson, with Mr. Lawrence is now a member of the Legislature for Colchester, was the county's next representative at Ottawa, and sat as a Liberal, and he was succeeded by the present Senator McKay, who carried the county for the Conservatives in 1874 and 1878 by large majorities. In 1881 Hon. A. W. McLellan resigned his seat in the senate and entered the federal government, Mr. McKay making way for him in Colchester, which elected him by a large majority, Mr. McKay taking the senate seat. Mr. McLellan was reelected in 1887, and on his becoming governor of Nova Scotia, Mr. W. A. Patterson another Conservative, carried the seat, he in turn being succeeded in 1896 by Mr. W. D. Dimock, Conservative. The latter, however, was unseated, and in the bye-election, Mr. Dimock retiring, the county was captured by the late Mr. McLure, who defeated the late Dr. D. H. Muir by six votes, the first time the seat had gone Liberal since Mr. Pearson's elections in 1870 and 1872. Mr. McLure, however, was beaten by Mr. Gourley in 1900, the county returning to its Conservative allegiance. Since that time, however, Colchester elected two Liberals to the Nova Scotia legislature by small majorities.

The fight in Colchester will be one of the hottest and most interesting in the Maritime Provinces, and will be watched with interest all over Canada. Both Mr. Lawrence and Mr. Gourley are excellent speakers, lawyers by profession, and thoroughly well known throughout the constituency. Mr. Lawrence was first elected to the legislature in 1886, and has been returned in each succeeding general election, and is serving his third term as Speaker, a position he adorns, and is rightly regarded as one of the ablest men in the Liberal party in Nova Scotia. His election

to the House of Commons would give Colchester a standing in that body it has not enjoyed since the retirement of Hon. A. W. McLellan from public life.

Premier Ross of Ontario, is having hard luck in the election courts. Two of his supporters have been unseated, and now it is announced that the petition against Mr. Clarke, the Tory member for Centre Bruce, has been dismissed. The government majority is now so small that an early appeal to the people seems inevitable.

In his stump speech at Windsor, Ont., Mr. Borden spoke of Dr. Pickell, turned down by Hon. Sydney Fisher at Sweetsburg, Quebec, as "a very capable officer." Dr. Pickell never had a military uniform on in his life, and was entirely lacking in military knowledge, so Mr. Borden was simply deceiving his audience.
