

AGED CITIZEN GONE

Mr. W. H. Anderson Passes Away After a Lingering Illness.

WAS AT ONE TIME A MEMBER OF THE CITY COUNCIL—A VETERAN ORANGEMAN.

Mr. William H. Anderson, one of Fredericton's oldest and best known citizens, passed away at his home on Brunswick Street at ten o'clock this morning. He had been ailing for over a year and has been confined to his home for the past eighteen months. His death was due to the infirmities of age, and towards the last he suffered a great deal.

The deceased gentleman was a native of St. John but has resided in this city since his boyhood days. His father was the late Capt. W. H. Anderson, who came to St. John with the United Empire Loyalists in 1783, and afterwards commanded a company of the famous 104th regiment, which made a midwinter march from St. John to Quebec during the war of 1812. The late Mr. Anderson was a shoe maker by trade and for a great many years was in the employ of the late Mr. Clarke who conducted a shop on Queen street, and later was employed at Palmer's tannery. For twenty-two years he held the position of roadmaster of the city in conjunction with that of chief engineer of the fire department, and discharged his duties in an eminently satisfactory manner. He took an active interest in civic affairs and represented Wellington Ward in the city council for five years. Mr. Anderson had the distinction of being the oldest orangeman in New Brunswick, having been identified with the order for the long period of sixty years, and for twenty-five years he was County Master for York. He was a member of St. Ann's church and for many years held the position of vestryman. In politics he was a pronounced conservative. A man of kindly disposition, honest and upright, Mr. Anderson was generally esteemed by his acquaintances and by his death one of the old landmarks of the city is removed.

The deceased was in his 81st year and is survived by a family of three daughters and four sons. They are Mrs. A. S. Thompson, the Hon. Mrs. Ashburnham and Miss Lucy Anderson, of this city, John Anderson of East Somerville, James of Clair Station, Hamilton of Montana, and Henry of this city. Mrs. Anderson predeceased her husband by seven years. Mr. Robert Anderson of Kingsclear is a brother.

The funeral will be held from the homestead on Brunswick street at 3 p. m. tomorrow. Services will be held at St. Ann's church and interment will be made at the old burying ground.

FREDERICTON BOY ARRESTED

For Attempting to Pass a Spurious Bank Bill at St. John Exhibition.

Says the St. John Sun:—Some excitement was caused at one of the exhibition booths between four and five o'clock yesterday afternoon, when a young man named Gerald O'Brien was arrested for attempting to pass spurious money. The booth was that of Mr. Phillips, where refreshments are sold. O'Brien went up to the place, made a purchase, offering in payment a five dollar bill. The attendant noticed that the bill was an old Confederate one, and at once mentioned it to O'Brien. The latter made a dash for the door and went out to the grounds. If he had mixed with the crowd it is quite likely that he would not have been noticed, but after he went out into the open the police had no difficulty in catching him. Two officers chased him, and although he ran as hard as he could, succeeded in catching him about half way up Germaine street. He was very much afraid. The policemen took him to the central station, where he is now confined.

Mr. J. H. Barry, a prominent Fredericton lawyer, told the Sun last night that young O'Brien is a boy of good character and he was surprised to hear of him being connected with anything like this. Mr. Barry said that when O'Brien came to the city he bought up some of these old bills. When he went to the exhibition grounds he was in company with some other boys who dared him to pass one of the bills and as a result of this O'Brien went to the booth and bought ten cents worth of goods giving as payment the worthless money. When he saw that he had been detected and that the policemen were on his track he became very much frightened and thinking the best thing for him to do would be to leave the grounds, started to run away.

Mr. Barry thinks the boy did the act without stopping to think how serious the consequences might be. When arrested he had one dollar and a half on his person and several spurious bills. He had also a quantity of the Currie Business College bills.

O'Brien is nineteen years of age, and comes from Fredericton.
