HEAVY RAINFALL.

Last Night's Storm One of the Worst for Some Months.

One of the heaviest rain storms that has visited this section in many months, set in at 8.30 o'clock last evening and continued without intermission until four o'clock this afternoon. At times during the night it came down in torrents, and as it is reported to have been general throughout the province, no doubt a sharp rise of water in the river will follow in its wake. The rain fall is naturally welcomed by the lumbermen interested in the corporation drive getting out, but the farmers are not so pleased over it, as they want fine weather just now to enable them to finish gathering their crops.

A telegram from Edmundston at noon today stated that it had been raining there incessantly since last evening, but there was little change in the condition of the river. The information from Woodstock is of the same nature.

The water in the river here has fallen about four feet since the last freshet, but for two days past it has been about stationary. As a result of last night's storm a rise of from four to six feet is expected. Mill owners will no doubt profit by the lesson taught them by the last storm and take steps to prevent their logs from going adrift this time.

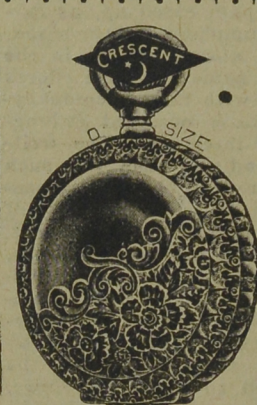
